17 Engineers Were Held Up At Barracks

Seventeen members of a topographical party of the Dominion Government got into trouble at Tete de Pont barracks on Thursday afternoon. The party have been making a survey of the district, and are now working here. They ignored the command of the sentry at Tete de Pont barracks to stop when they had entered upon forbidden ground, and the guard fired a shot over their heads to show them that he meant business. The seventeen men were placed in detention and held for five hours until their identity was established by the Department at Ottawa. The fact that the engineers had maps in their possession made the military authorities suspicious of them. Apologies followed, and the engineers proceeded to survey the shore line at the barracks.

The retiring president, Mrs. Revelle, read a communication from the League of the Empire, asking that the news at home be sent to the soldiers at the front. This matter will be taken up through the school and Miss Harold will look after the arrangements. On Friday evening, M. R. Reid, Inspector for North Frontenac schools, gave an address on "Nature Study." This subject came on the muck talked of Part 1 examinations the discussion of which took up much time at the convention.

C. C. Main gave a very interesting talk on Friday afternoon on School Fairs and showed their advantages of having these instructions. Miss Freeman read her report of the O.E.A. on Friday afternoon.

Slipped Down the Slide Way Into Drydock

H. Ryder, an employee of the Kingston Shipbuilding Company, had a narrow escape from drowning in the drydock on Friday night. After the Ontario Car Ferry had been floated, Mr. Ryder was walking around the dock with a lantern in his hand to see if everything was right. While opposite the slide way at the western end of the dock he slipped and went down the incline into the water faster than any toboggan could have made the descent. Mr. Ryder slipped underneath the beam, but managed to swim out of his perilous position to safety. He was pulled from the water by two other employees.

HELPING THE CAUSE.

Battersea Contributions to the Patriotic Funds.

Battersea people have shown that they are willing and anxious to do their share in contributing to the various patriotic funds. On Friday evening an enjoyable and largely attended concert and social was held in the Orange Hall, generously given for the purpose by the Orange Lodge. Anglin.

Rev. Mr. Stewart gave a stirring and eloquent address in which he appealed to all the young men present to offer their services in defence of Canada and the Empire. The proceeds of the concert amounted to nearly forty dollars. The ladies of Battersea have also contributed and collected \$35.83 with which they purchased cotton for hospital night-shirts for overseas soldiers, the ladies of the village and vicinity making the shirts and sending them to the Red Cross Society in Kingston. Since the beginning of August they have sent three pairs of socks and forty-two shirts, and still have a whole web of cotton which they intend to make up. Battersea contributed to the Tobacco Fund \$25 collected by Miss Sands, and \$3.75 collected by the post-office.
