DEATH RESULT OF BURNS

John Johnston, Loses His Life At San Jose, Cal.

Kemptville, Oct. 4 .- Word has been received of the death of John Johnston, San Jose, Cal. Mr. Johnston is a native of Ontario, and resided near Kemptville before Pemoving to California some twenty-five

On September 2nd fire broke out in one of Mr. Johnston's warehouses, and being filled with hay the fire quickly spread, resulting in the total destruction of his three large warehouses and other outbuildings. During the fire Mr. Johnston entered the stable to try and liberate a valuable horse and received burns so severe that he had to be taken at once to the hospital. Everything possible was done for his recovery, but the burns proved fatal, and he passed away on Sunday, September 19th.

Mr. Johnston is survived by his wife, two sons and two daughters, namely: Edgar, of Winnipeg; Mark, of Honolulu, H.L.; Mrs. Walzy Percival, of Burritt's Rapids, and Mrs. W. A. Swain, of Gridley, California.


