CARMAN BELL WRITES NAPANEE COURT CASE

FROM THE FRONT TO HIS PAR- OVER THE USE OF A PUMP BY THE PUBLIC.

Said The Canadians Had Been Spending Their Time In As Pleasant a Way As Could Be Expected.

The following extracts from Carman Bell's letters to his parents, 44 Albert street, show that, in the usual sound of work, pleasure, and religious duties, the boys at the front are spending their time in as pleasant a way as can possibly be expected.

Sept. 5th—Received your letter of the 19th ult., last night. I suppose you were referring to the board at Shorncliffe. We haven't much kick in that respect here.

"We are now back at what I believe is called a 'Rest Camp.' We're resting all right, scraping mud off ourselves and trying to keep out of the mud. We are provided with wooden huts, about twenty men to each, which are very good indeed, being strictly weather proof.

"Received another bundle of Whigs yesterday, for which I am much obliged. I noticed you marked the item about spirits scaring the Germans. Believe me, if I get back alive, and can get an audience, I'll have not only seen but talked with 'angels.'"

Sept. 19—Didn't go to the front trenches as we expected when writing on 6th inst., but back to the supports again and are now in the building with the concrete floor. Expect to make the front line the next trip for sure.

(By Our Own Correspondent.) Napanee, Oct. 6.—The steam barge John Randall left yesterday for Kingston with wheat, from the granary of F. E. VanLoven. Schooner Keewatin arrived with coal for P. Gleason, and the William Jamieson with a load for Charles Stevens.
