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

Napanee, Oct. 9 .- The inquest on the body of Harold Hunter, killed on the Newburgh road Thursday even ing, when the automobile which he was driving turned turtle at the foot of a hill near P. Madden's farm, was held yesterday in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall. A jury was empanelled and viewed the body and the scene of the accident, and then adjourned until two o'clock. Jones, undertaker of Tamworth took charge of the remains and took them back to Tamworth, where the unfortunate boy lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Hunter.
