**THE WAR WILL BE DECIDED ON THE WESTERN FRONT**

If the Teutons Were to Reach Constantinople. THIS WOULD NOT MEAN FINAL VICTORY FOR THEM. MILITARY EXPERT SAYS.

If Germany Presses Further East, Then She Will Have To Deal With Britain's Ally, Japan.

London, Oct. 12.—Col. Repington, the London Times military expert writes:

There either are or soon will be 250,000 to 300,000 Germans under General Mackensen concentrated against Serbia. Austrian troops on the Drina will co-operate by moving east. We should not doubt the ability of Serbia to deal with this invasion if it stood alone, but the addition of the Bulgarian army to Serbia's enemies is a fatal danger and comes from a fatal direction.

We cannot suppose that the Bulgarian offensive will be conducted with fewer than 300,000 men, and if the Turks take over Caria and the Black Sea front the number may be higher.

That Serbia will give a good account of herself we are sure, but unless from 300,000 to 400,000 Allied troops come to her aid in time the chances of successful resistance are not great. The Bulgarians probably will soon be heard of on the Timok and the Nisava.

**Serbs Denuding Nish.**

The removal of the Serbian archives from Nish shows that a Bulgarian attack on this town is anticipated. The despatch of a small force of Allied troops from Saloniki to Serbia is not a military operation, and could only be regarded as the repayment of a debt of honor and a tribute to the heroism and constancy of our Serbian ally. If Greece or Roumania or both enter the field on our side the failure of the attack on Serbia is assured, and the war at once will assume a different aspect.

Failing, however, of the active intervention of one or both of these States or the prompt junction of 300,000 Allied troops with the Serbians, Germany has the best of the deal. The Germans are welcome to their diversion in the Balkans if as a result Russia is given the winter in which to recuperate and the campaign in the west goes against Germany. The quarter of a million men under Mackensen might have taken Rovno or Dvinsk or Riga or passed the Russian centre east of Minsk, and then might have carried out a strong counter-offensive against France.

**Press West Offensive.**

For lack of them German invasion of Russia has languished for the last three weeks. It is for us to take advantage of the moment to press our offensive in the west and for Russia to strive by every means to build up new armies and complete her equipment. It is on the French and Russian frontiers that this war will be decided, and more surely in our favor than were we victorious in the main theatre, while Germany's ambitions tempt her farther east toward Asia and India, then the casus foederis under our treaty with Japan would come into force and a fresh enemy face the Germans.

**BROKE NECK IN GAME**

**"GLAD" MURPHY TERRIBLY INJURED IN TORONTO.**

Sustained Fracture Of Vertebrae—May Result Fatally—Great Rugby Player Born and Educated in Kingston.

A Toronto despatch says: The most regrettable occurrence in connection with any sporting affair in this city in a generation was the serious—probably fatal—injury to "Glad" Murphy in the Argonaut-Hamilton football game at Rosedale on Saturday. This player, one of the most popular and worthy young men that has ever appeared on a playing field, tried a flying tackle on Manson of the Tigers as the latter was racing up the field. He missed his mark, but his explicit manner, possibly from the shock of striking the ground, received the injury that it is now feared will have a fatal termination. When he did not rise he was immediately attended to and removed from the field, quite cheerful but unable to help himself, though the serious nature of the accident was not at first suspected. Dr. Lawson ordered his immediate removal to the hospital, and the ambulance took him to St. Michael's, where a consultation was held with Dr. Bruce and Dr. Dwyer. The X-ray examination showed a fracture of the fifth cervical vertebrae, but it is not yet clear what injury has been suffered by the spinal cord itself, and upon that depends the amount of recovery possible. The fracture of the bone is not necessarily fatal, unless accompanied by the crushing of the spinal cord.

At present the attending medical men can hold out little hope, and advice of his condition was immediately sent to the members of his family. His father is dead, but his mother is living. He has five brothers and three sisters, all of the latter being members of a religious order. He was conscious Sunday, though paralyzed from the head down.

It would be hard to name an individual in football as popular as great and deserved popularity here, both with spectators and his fellow-players, as William Ewart Gladstone Murphy, and his news of his terrible injury will be a source of real and deep distress to a vast number of people. A fearless, useful and willing worker at whatever he was engaged in, he was beloved for his unflinching good-temper, his high ideals and his consistent regard for play as play. Nor has there been in years a better all-round man in sports that test a man. He received in summer, played football in the autumn and hockey in the winter, and was absolutely first-class at all these games. Playing for the Argonaut football club for the last five seasons, he was captain of the team when they won the Dominion championship last year. Four times he was on runners-up for the senior championship of the Ontario Hockey Association, the Argonauts in 1911, and St. Michael's in 1913, 1914 and 1915.

He had been a long time with the Dominion Bank and recently gave up his position in order to qualify as an aviator for service with the Imperial forces. His term at the Island school was just completed, and he was continuing his instruction at the Long Branch flying depot. On this account he was reluctant to enter football this season, and had consented to play in Saturday's game only for the purpose of helping out his old club-mates. Mr. Murphy was born and educated in Kingston. He is a son of Mrs. J. B. Murphy.

**Called German a Liar.**

For Saying Kitchener Was Disappointed At Canadians.

London, Oct. 12.—The most pathetic question asked me by returned wounded Canadians emerging from German captivity was: "Did our boys do well at Ypres?"

"A German officer told me," said one, "that Kitchener expressed great dissatisfaction with the Canadians' fighting."

"That German was a liar," I replied.

"I told him he was," said the wounded soldier, "but I am glad to hear you say it. You see my ancestors fought with Wolfe, and I wanted Canada to make a good showing."

These nine Canadian were hungry for news. They knew Ypres as a busy town, and they listened almost incredulously as I described it to them as I last saw it—one great ruin whose only civilian inhabitants were rats.

Their general experiences were good concerning recent German medical treatment, but bad concerning prison camps, although the camps are now much better than a few months ago. They brought messages from men still captive.

**Constantine's Duplicity.**

King Constantine's repudiation of the treaty of alliance with Serbia, the dismissal of Premier Venizelos and the prospect of Greek neutrality have placed Serbia in a most critical position. It may be possible for France and Britain to save the situation by rushing armies to the Balkan peninsula with all haste. Not less than three or four hundred thousand troops are needed. Without adequate aid Serbia is doomed, and a great Austro-Hungarian army will be at Constantinople in a few weeks. The difficulty of transporting so great a force by sea will be tremendous; but it looks as though the thing must be done.

**BOSTON WINS TWO GAMES**

In World's Baseball Championship Series.

**TWO 2-1 VICTORIES**

OVER PHILADELPHIA, THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONS.

Pitcher Foster Won For the Red Sox—the Boston Players Batting Much Better Than Their Opponents.

Philadelphia, Oct. 11.—This must be the story of George Foster and the Red Sox rather than that of the Red Sox and George Foster. On Saturday, when the Bostonians drew on level terms with the Philadelphiaans in the second of the world's series, it was Foster who turned the trick—turned it almost unassisted.

The little Red Sox twirler held the slugging Phillies to three hits, but he made as many hits himself as he allowed the opposing team. He drove in the winning run with a slashing, single, and a number of clean, clean two-bagger among his safeties. So much for his hitting.

The holding of Foster was of a sparkling order. He had three putouts at first base, never failing to cover a smash hit in the right of error, and he held the batter who Hoblitzel could not hold his first base were transformed from singles to outs because Foster hustled over and played the bag. Jack Barry, the former Athletic shortstop, pitched behind Hoblitzel and received the ball and got away from the first baseman. Right there on the bag was Foster, who took the throw and retired the man. Some fielding.

Foster's most effective ball Saturday was a curve with a sharp, downward break. His control was marvellous. He did not give a base on balls and struck out eight batsmen. He kept the ball inside and outside of the plate at will, but seldom failed to "cut the corners." Such pitching was unbeatable. He will probably be sent back to the National League champions on Tuesday.

Alexander MacGregor Injured—Motor Ambulance for Queen's Stationary Hospital Has Arrived at Napanee.

Napanee, Oct. 12.—The remains of the late R. Logan Roe, a former resident of Napanee, who died at Renovo, Pa., were brought here and buried from the Anglican Church. Deceased will be remembered by the old residents here as a son of the late Alexander Roe, an ex-M. P. for Lennox. He was about fifty-two years of age.

The motor ambulance which the Red Cross Societies of Lennox and Addington Counties are giving to the Queen's Stationary Hospital at Cairo, has been brought here from Oshawa where it was made.

Alexander MacGregor, met with a nasty accident yesterday. He was climbing up a ladder in the upper story of his store to go out on the roof. The ladder slipped out at the bottom, throwing Mr. MacGregor about eight feet on to the floor. He fell on his back and was badly bruised and shaken up.

Edward Snider, Belleville, charged on remand with forging bank cheques here on September 30th, appeared before Magistrate Rankin yesterday and elected to be tried summarily. He pleaded guilty and was remanded for eight days for sentence.
