Dr. W. L. Goodwin Was Elected President—Thomas M. Asselstine Has Retired As Honorary Secretary.

The annual meeting of the Kingston Curling Club was held on Tuesday evening and was largely attended. W. R. Given presided.

Reports of various officers showed that the finances were in excellent shape. A number of new members were admitted and applications from a number of others received. The proposition to reduce the membership to 120 was defeated.

It was decided to return to the old method of choosing vice-skips. Each skip will be given one week in which to select his vice-skip.

An important change was made in that the method of penalizing for the substitution of players was abolished. In future, players may be substituted without that rick forfeiting points as a penalty.

Probably the most important motion of the meeting was passed practically unanimously. In future no beverages of an alcoholic nature will be permitted to be brought into the club or used on the club premises. The club will in future be strictly "on the wagon," both in private and a club way.

The election of officers resulted: President, Dr. W. L. Goodwin; vice-president, W. R. Sills; superintendent of ice, M. P. Reid; committee, P. D. Lyman, G. Nichol, Prof. J. A. McRae, J. M. Elliott and T. Slater; auditors, T. Roland and R. E. Burns.

The representative member from this club to the Ontario Curling Club is T. M. Asselstine, with Dr. Goodwin as alternate member. W. H. Montgomery and C. F. Smith were elected as delegates to the C. O. C. League.

The offices of honorary secretary and honorary treasurer were not filled. T. M. Asselstine and W. H. Montgomery, who were respectively secretary and treasurer, having put in their resignations. Mr. Asselstine has been secretary for seven years, and due to his proficiency as a curler, has proved himself invaluable in solving the many problems that arise in a season and which must be settled by some one who is thoroughly acquainted with the conditions. The members are sincere in the hope that Mr. Asselstine will see fit to withdraw his resignation, as it will be practically impossible to fill the position with as capable a man.

It is understood that in the event of Mr. Asselstine absolutely refusing to reconsider his decision, the two offices of secretary and treasurer will be amalgamated, and an honorarium provided for the man appointed to look after the work until successors can be appointed.

All overseas members of the club, it was decided, will be retained until they return to the city. It is the intention of the club to send Christmas parties to the club soldiers at the front.

The report of the committee recommending the formation of singles, doubles and Scotch doubles and "drawing" competition was adopted. In the drawing competition entries are unlimited and those entering will be charged a small fee, which will go to some patriotic fund.

It was clearly shown at the meeting that the members intend to carry on the curling as in previous years, but they will contribute their share to patriotic purposes.
