

By Advertising. New York, Oct. 6 .- How California had increased its fruit shipments from 2,000 carloads in 1885 to 50,-000 carloads now was described by G. Harold Powell, general manager of the California Fruit Growers Exchange in an address before the Quoin Club at Delmonico's. "The value of the orange and le-

mon crop shipped through the California Fruit Growers Exchange every year exceeds the value of all the mineral products of the state," declared Mr. Powell, "in fact, the total valuation of this fruit is \$27,000,000. There is \$200,000,000 invested California's ditrus industry," "Thirteen to fifteen thousand families are living on land worth \$1,000 an acre, and 150,000 persons are directly and indirectly supported by the industry. The California Fruit Growers Exchange, finally was formed for the purpose of economical handling the distribution of the fruit. The Exchange is entirely a non-profit orga-

According to the speaker, 65 per cent of the growers of oranges, lemons and grape fruit in California are members of the Exchange, About 30 per cent of the product is sold at auction in the big markets of the

"Where does your money go when you buy \$1 worth of oranges?" Mr. Powell asked his hearers. Answering the question himself he said, "about one-third of the dollar goes to cover the cost of getting the fruit to the consumer. The wholesaler's cost is 8.2 per cent, the Exchange cost 1.5 per cent, and 20 per cent goes for transportation charges.




