### AUTO AND CAR COLLIDE HOME RUNS WON GAME

AND MISS HART, MADOC, WAS SEVERELY CUT.

On the Face By Wind-Shield Glass—The Young Lady Was Taken To the General Hospital.

What might have proved a very serious accident for seven people occurred at 11.15 p.m. Wednesday, when an automobile owned and driven by Howard Kelly, a chauffeur from Madoc, collided with street-car No. 14 at the corner of Princess and King streets.

Mr. Kelly, driving an Overland automobile, with License No. 37900, was coming along King street with Mrs. Ackman and her daughter, Miss Gertrude, Miss Hart and Misses Sevensmith all of Madoc. The party arrived in the city on Wednesday afternoon and were on their way home.

Street car No. 14, in charge of Motorman P. Reynolds and Conductor W. Woods, the last car from Portsmouth, was coming down Princess street, slowing down to stop at the corner to discharge three passengers before going into the barns.

In conversation with the Whig, Mr. Kelly said he thought the car would go straight ahead rather than turn to the right, and to avoid what would in that case be a severe accident he swung to the curb in front of McCall's store. He said he was going not over five miles an hour.

The street car and automobile collided, a part of the street car breaking the windshield and together doing about \$50 damage to the front of the automobile. Miss Hart was sitting in the front seat and part of the glass wind-shield gave her face a bad gash. J. Soucy, Barfieldfield camp, who was standing near at the time rescued her by pulling her out of danger. She was rushed to the General Hospital where Capt. R. B. Richardson and the house-surgeon attended to her injuries. Several stitches were necessary to close the wound. The cut is on the right side of her face the full length of the jaw-bone.

HOOPER, OF BOSTON RED SOX, MADE TWO.

He Gave Boston World's Championship By Smashing Out a Homer in the Ninth Inning.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 14.—Harry Hooper, the 1915 edition of Home-Run Baker, gave Boston another world's baseball championship yesterday afternoon with two home runs into the centre field bleachers. The Californian came to bat in the ninth with the score tied at 4-4, and sent the 1915 series into history with a terrific clout which cleared the centre field fence on the bounce by three feet. It was the fourth straight

victory for Boston and the third victory which had been won in the ninth inning by one run.

The crowd swarmed down on the field as Bill Killifer, pinch hitting for Rixey, made the last out, and fought to get near the Boston bench, where Hooper was being mobbed by his joyful team-mates.

For fifteen minutes after the game the crowd surged around the Boston bench, clamoring for a sight of the new home run hero, but he was spirited away, and the crowd was forced to depart without getting to him.

Philadelphia lost as befitting champions. After the weakest hitting in a world's series, the Phillies suddenly found their batting eyes at the start of the game and bombarded Foster for nine hits, including a double and a home run.

The game was the first really championship game of the series. It was replete with dramatic moments, terrific hitting in the pinches, and clever fielding.

The Phillies started out in the first inning to overtake the Red Sox

### FRUIT SHIPMENTS INCREASED

California's Fruit Trade Stimulated By Advertising.

New York, Oct. 6.—How California had increased its fruit shipments from 2,000 carloads in 1885 to 50,000 carloads now was described by G. Harold Powell, general manager of the California Fruit Growers Exchange in an address before the Quoin Club at Delmonico's.

"The value of the orange and lemon crop shipped through the California Fruit Growers Exchange every year exceeds the value of all the mineral products of the state," declared Mr. Powell. "In fact, the total value of this fruit is \$27,000,000. There is \$200,000,000 invested in California's citrus industry." "Thirteen to fifteen thousand families are living on land worth \$1,000 an acre, and 50,000 persons are directly and indirectly supported by the industry. The California Fruit Growers Exchange, finally was formed for the purpose of economical handling the distribution of the fruit. The Exchange is entirely a non-profit organization."

According to the speaker, 65 per cent of the growers of oranges, lemons and grape fruit in California are members of the Exchange. About 30 per cent of the product is sold at auction in the big markets of the East.

"Where does your money go when you buy \$1 worth of oranges?" Mr. Powell asked his hearers. Answering the question himself he said, "about one-third of the dollar goes to cover the cost of getting the fruit to the consumer. The wholesaler's cost is \$2 per cent, the Exchange cost 1.5 per cent, and 20 per cent goes for transportation charges.

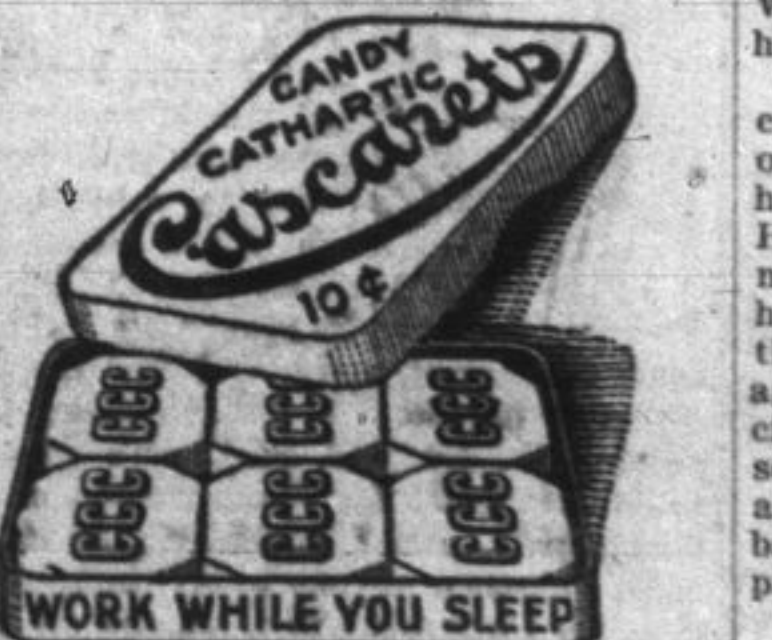
National advertising in newspapers and magazines has kept consumer demand in step with the great increase in the fruit crop, the speaker asserted.

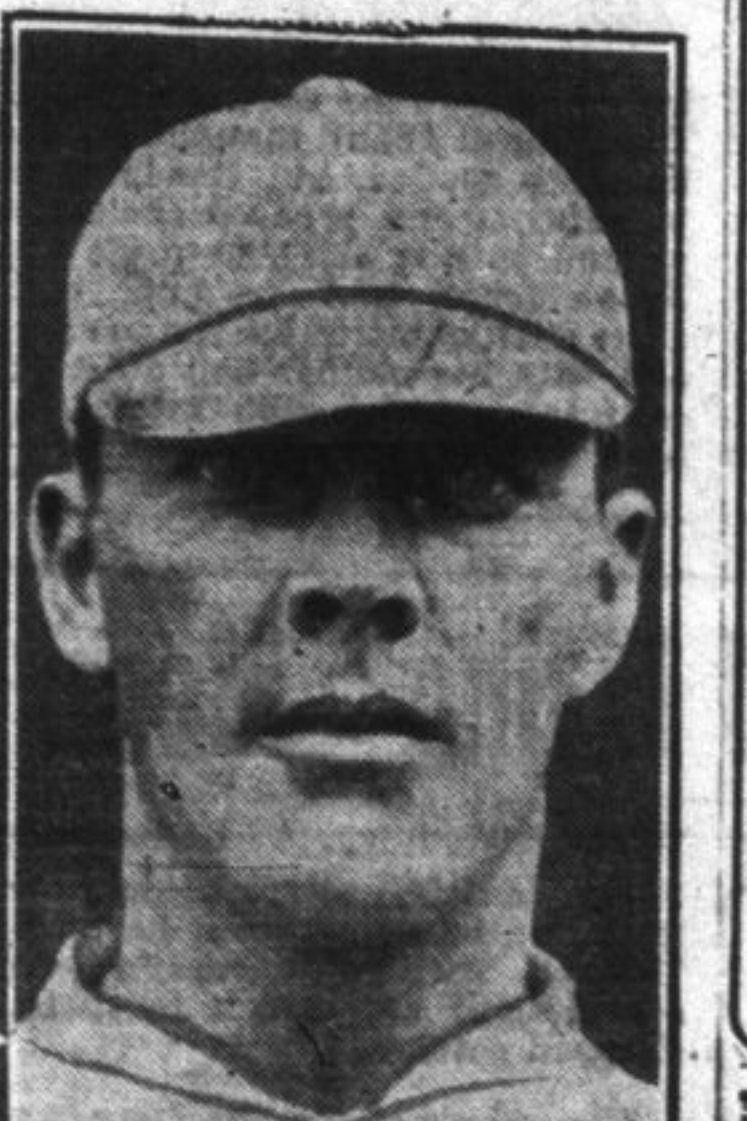

by bombarding Foster for two runs. Hooper with his first homer opened up the count in the third inning. Philadelphia forced ahead again in the fourth on Luderus' homer. Boston tied it again in the eighth on Lewis' homer, and Hooper's history-making wallop in the ninth was the grand finale to a sensational game.

Boston's outfield, named the best in baseball, lived up to its reputation. Duffy Lewis and Harry Hooper have easily been the sensations of an otherwise drab series by their terrific hitting in the pinches and marvellous spearing of Philadelphia hits.

Hooper, by his work yesterday, crowds Frank Baker off the ledger of world-series fame. Baker never hit any more opportunely than did Harry Hooper. In the fourth inning, with his team one run behind, he came to bat and lopped one into the crowd in centre field. Another again in the ninth innings of the crucial game of the series, with the score tied, he came to bat and sent another one into the same spot. The ball carried Philadelphia's championship hopes with it into oblivion.

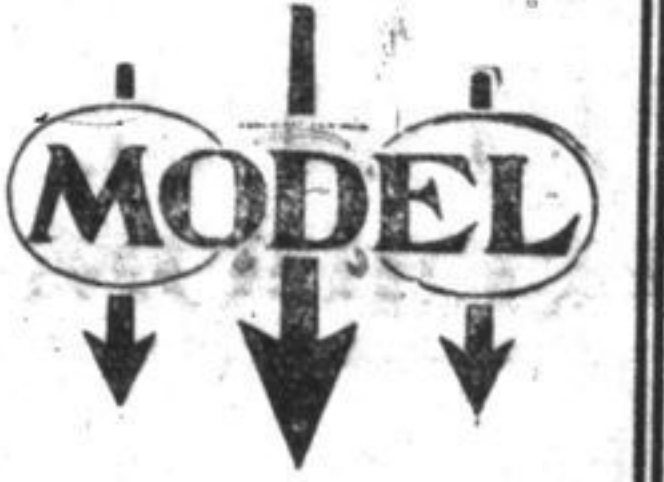
