

IN ENROLLMENT AT THE FACUL-TY OF EDUCATION.

At the Present Time 135 Candidates Have Been Enrolled-Prof W. T. MacClement Added To Staff.

The present total enrollment, in the Faculty of Education, at Queen's University, is 135. Of these 39 are candidates for the degrees in Pedagogy, 15 are extra-mural candidates for teachers' certificates, and 81 are intra-mural candidates for teachers' certificates: . These figures show an increase in all respects over all previous years. The total enrollment for last year (the largest up till that time) was 103 and the number of those in attendance upon classes was


