

## BIG CHIEF VAN HORNE

LATE RAILWAY BUILDER WAS A PICTURESQUE FIGURE.

In the Early Days of the C. P. R. Construction Work He Was Known as a Powerful Leader of Men With Cataclysms of Explosive Wrath and Sudden Flashes of Humor.

N his human side the late Sir William Van Herne was as attractive a figure as he was great in the field of railway management. In appearance he was short and rather corpulent, though his dimensions gave a feeling of massiveness and power. His voice was deep-chested and on oc-
