WILL BUY MACHINERY

FOR CONCRETE AND ASPHALT MIXING FOR ROADS.

Board of Works Wants a Plant As the City Engineer Has Built Some First Class Roads At a Low Cost.

At the Board of Works meeting on Tuesday afternoon, it was decided to secure tender for concrete and asphalt mixing plant for road making. The City Engineer estimated that \$2,200 would buy the amount of machinery the city had leased this past summer from the Kingston Concrete Company. The latter replied that its plant was not for sale, the Board of Works having expressed a desire to purchase it.

Chairman Graham stated that the asphalt macadam roads on Aberdeen and William streets laid this past season would cost the property owners only \$1.24 a running foot. The roads were laid as good and much cheaper than they could be done by contract. The work was done by City Engineer McClelland.

N. C. Polson, Jr., asked the Board to construct a sewer in King street near St. Lawrence avenue to drain property purchased by his father who intended to build a residence next spring. At present there is no sewer on that part of King street.

Residents have constructed private sewers into the gutter. Polson said the Medical Health Officer had reported that such drainage was contrary to the Public Health Act. The matter was referred to the Chairman and the Engineer for report.

The Chairman and the Engineer were also instructed to make a further report as to some property trouble on what is known as Joseph street, near Russell. It was suggested that a remedy would be to open Joseph street to Montreal, but as there are not likely to be any houses erected there for some time, the members came to the conclusion not to open the street just now.

When a request was read from John Morris for permission to erect a small gasoline tank at the corner of Brock and Ontario streets on C. P. R. property, Ald. Nickle entered a protest against such permission being given. He claimed that the carters' shack on that corner was an eyesore in front of the City Buildings and should never have been permitted to be placed there. The Board decided to ask the C.P.R. company not to allow any structure to be erected at that corner.

The City Engineer reported that the Windsor Construction Company had given him authority to proceed and make repairs to the concrete work at the corner of West and Wellington streets, which has been heaved, and which was in a dangerous condition.

In attendance at the meeting were Alds. Graham, Couper, Nickle, O'Connor, Peters and Richardson.

Enlisted at Regina.
W. H. Warren, of McKelvey & Birch's, has received a letter from his second son, Sydney, who states that he has enlisted in the Regina battery which is at Camp Hughes. This is the second son of Mr. Warren to offer for overseas service, one being now at the front.
