THE BOARD OF TRADE DEALS WITH POWER QUESTION

Will Investigate the Increased Rates Charged.

BOARD TO CO-OPERATE TO SECURE EMPLOYMENT FOR RETURNING SOLDIERS

The C. P. R. To Be Asked For Better Freight Accommodation Between Kingston and Renfrew.

Appointed committee to co-operate with the City Council and the Patriotic Committee to secure employment for soldiers returning from the front.

Instructed Power Committee of the Board to take up the whole question of power charges in the city, and report back. N. C. Polson, Jr., declared that the rates must be adjusted in order to give Kingston a chance to grow.

Will ask C. P. R. for better freight accommodation between Kingston and Renfrew, and for better passenger connection with the west at Sharbot Lake.

Question of cold storage for Kingston will also be reported. Instructed Council of Board to report on suggestion for raising of additional money in Kingston for the Patriotic Fund.

"That the Power Committee take up the whole question of power and report to the Board." The above resolution, moved by N. C. Polson, Jr., and seconded by R. A. McLelland, was passed at a meeting of the Board of Trade on Tuesday night.

The question of power and the rates charged in Kingston, was brought to the attention of the Board by Mr. Polson, who stated that it was a matter that might well be taken up and given a frank discussion. He declared that the rates charged to users of power in the city were causing much dissatisfaction. Kingston was paying the highest rates charged in the province of Ontario, and it was high time that some action should be taken to bring about a remedy.

"I do not think that Kingston should stand for the rates we have to-day," said Mr. Polson. "We are all anxious to see the city grow, but we will never be able to get new industries if the present conditions regarding the cost of power are allowed to exist."

W. R. Givens said that he had been out of the city, and had been very much surprised to find that at the last meeting of the Board, the entire discussion on power had been given over to the question of supplying of power to the Street Railway Company. The question of power for the Street Railway Company was an important issue, but he considered that the charges to the users of power was also a most vital question. He understood that a special rate had been made by the Utilities Commission for the power used by the city churches. He thought it was up to the city to get reasonable rates for the general users of the power.

The President of the Board explained that while the street railway question had been discussed at the last meeting, the meeting was open for a free discussion of the whole power question.

W. T. Minnes corroborated the President on this point. Mr. Polson stated that the charges for power had been multiplied two and three times, although there had been promises of a twenty per cent. reduction.

"Kingston has lost her self-respect to sit down under such conditions," remarked Mr. Polson. "I regret that this is a matter which would meet with the approval of the City Council and the general public."

Ald. J. S. R. McCann regarded the suggestion as a good one. He thought the matter would be dealt with by the City Council.

The Board had before it a resolution from the Board of Trade of Berlin, Ont., dealing with the question, and which the local Board was asked to endorse.

The Berlin Board called upon civic bodies to make provision for those returning from the front who found their former positions had been filled.

The President suggested that a bureau might be opened where a list of the good, reliable men might be kept. The matter was one which required serious attention, as many men would be returning from the front.

"We do not appear to realize the serious state we are in," added the President. "We need to have a couple of Zeppelins pass over the city in order that we might realize the perils and the serious stage we are passing through. Germany is taking every means to educate men disabled in the war for some other post of duty, and it is up to us here in Canada to do the same."

Mr. Nickle said that no city in Canada had benefited more than Kingston as a result of the soldiers, and he felt that the soldiers returning from the front should be cared for. Able-bodied young men who were in a position to go to the front were being given work at home. He knew of three or four employed by the city hall who could well go to the front. Every man returning from overseas service should be given a chance to make good in some position if it could be secured for him.

It was finally decided, on motion of Mr. Polson and R. J. Carson, that a committee be appointed by the Board to co-operate with the City Council and the Patriotic Committee

toward the end of securing employment for returned soldiers from the front.

The President and Mr. Polson will select the committee.

Patriotic Fund.
The President drew attention to the fact that a second call was to be made shortly for the Canadian Patriotic Fund. A campaign had to be launched to raise \$7,500,000 in Canada. Kingston would have to bear a share in the amount, and he thought the Board should take up the matter and express an opinion as to how the money should be raised. The suggestion he had to offer was as to whether the City Council should make a grant of so much money every month, to be raised by taxation.

R. J. Carson spoke in favor of the scheme to have the Council grant the money in this way. It was decided to refer the matter to the Council of the Board for report.

The President announced that Ald. Newman was to have been present to address the Board on his resolution submitted at the last meeting of the City Council, asking the ratemakers to vote to have two aldermen elected from each ward, making a total of fourteen instead of twenty-one, with a term of one year. Ald. Newman was suffering from a severe cold and unable to attend the meeting. He will address the Board at its next meeting.

The President announced that John Donnelly, chairman of the membership committee, was unable to be present at the meeting, but was ready to receive membership fees.

The Board received a letter from John King, vice Belgian consul at Fort William, regarding Government assistance to homesteaders, but no action was taken.

The president, Robert Meek, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were R. J. Carson, F. G. Lockett, Joseph Power, F. A. Conway, Rev. J. D. Boyd, Ald. W. H. Wormwith, John Smith, F.
