Earl Grey And the Fund.

Earl Grey has taken an active interest in the work of the Over-Sea Club ever since its formation, and as one of the vice-presidents, has recently written to the hon. secretary and organizer, expressing his delight at the work accomplished in connection with the Tobacco Fund. He makes special reference to the sums contributed from Canada.

Francis R. Jones, Windsor Hotel, Montreal, who is organizing the work in the Dominion, has furnished us with a copy of the letter which we have pleasure in reproducing: "October 15, 1915. "Dear Mr. Wrensch: "I am much interested to learn of the splendid response which the Over-Sea Club has received from the Dominion of Canada to its appeal to provide tobacco and cigarettes for our brave men at the front. A total of \$61,000 collected from all parts of the Empire in twelve months is a result of which I think we can all be proud. "I was particularly interested to hear that such a large sum (\$50,000) has come from Canada. I

feel sure that it was a very wise move on your part, making arrangements to supply Canadian manufactured tobacco for Canadian troops.

"The fact that the central organization of the Over-Sea Club has administered this large sum of money without deducting anything whatever for expenses from the generous subscriptions of residents overseas, is, I am sure, one of the contributory causes of the great success of the Over-Sea Club Tobacco Fund. CAPT. PENSE ATTENDS

A SCHOOL OF FRENCH WARFARE IN FRANCE.

He and Major W. A. Mitchell Had To Jump To Escape Exploding Bomb—The 21st Back in the Trenches.

A big batch of letters were received in the city on Saturday and Monday from members of the 21st Battalion now serving with the Second Canadian Division in France. The letters state that the 21st Battalion came out of the trenches on Friday night, October 8th, and was relieved by another Canadian battalion. It was not expected that the battalion would go into the same trenches again, but would be moved to another section of the line. The men were in haste. The headquarters of the battalion is situated in a house. Everything is O. K. A church parade was held on Sunday morning, October 10th, when the chaplain, Capt. W. E. Kidd, spoke regarding God's overruling providence.

Capt. H. E. Pense, a former member of the Whig staff, was detailed to report with two N. C. O.'s on Monday morning, October 11th, at a school of trench warfare, which was not far from where the 21st Battalion was located in billets. One officer was selected from each of the battalions from the second division to take this course.

The men realized that two weeks in the trenches is an awful strain, and for that reason they were glad to get a rest. Captain A. Stroud and Capt. H. E. Pense rode to a small town and had a good time. They met two French girls who understood English fairly well. While in the restaurant they had a good meal. The two French girls stated that one year ago the following day the Germans were in that town, but the British drove them out.

Capt. Pense tore a leaf off the Scripture calendar which hung on the wall in the restaurant, and forwarded it to his parents. Letters dated October 11th state that the battalion expected to go back to the trenches on Thursday, October 14th.

On Monday afternoon Capt. Pense, in company with a number of the officers who were attending the school of trench warfare, were engaged in digging with pick and shovel. During the morning Capt. Pense had an opportunity to meet Major W. A. Mitchell. While the two Kingstonians were engrossed in conversation they forgot about their horses, which scampered off. The officers jumped aside when a bomb exploded, but no one was hurt.
