COMPARISON OF AMOUNTS PAID IN VARIOUS CENTRES

Eighty-Four Cents Per Head of Population Was Paid Into the Fund by Ontario During First Year of the War.

WHOLE OF THE MONEY CONTRIBUTED GOES FOR SUPPLIES

Every Cent is Spent For the Purchase of Canadian Tobacco and Cigarettes—How the Fund Stands. The Postmaster at Bath Road has sent in to the Whig a list of contributions to the Tobacco Fund amounting to \$7.75.

It has been decided to increase the size and quality of the cigarettes and to slightly reduce the quantity of tobacco. The packet now being sent to the soldiers for each 25c subscribed contains the following:

50 Canadian manufactured cigarettes of best quality. Packet containing one-fifth pound Canadian manufactured tobacco of good standard quality. Box of matches.
