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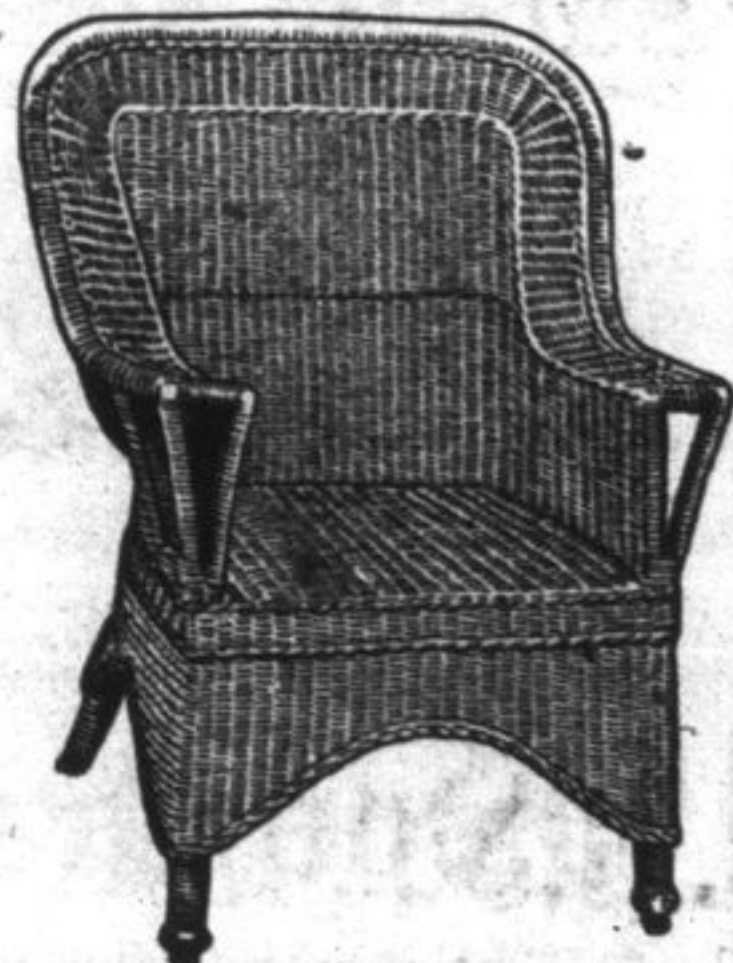

ON BARRIEFIELD HEIGHTS WITH THE OVERSEAS TROOPS

The 59th Battalion left Barrie field camp on Tuesday afternoon and was out all night carrying out an extensive scheme similar to that which at any time might have to be met with by a battalion of infantry. The orders under which the battalion acted were issued by Lieut.-Col. H. J. Dawson about twenty minutes to three o'clock and the officers had little time to make plans for the big event. "A," "B" and "C" companies formed an advance guard of a force moving from Kingston along the Gananoque road. A report, so the orders read, has been received that an imaginary force of 1,500 men of all arms, less cavalry, had left Gananoque at 11 a.m., and was moving towards Kingston.

The main body encamped in the night at a point about half a mile east of Barrie field. The advance guard with one company of the 80th Battalion and one of the 8th C. M. R. (both imaginary bodies of troops) furnished the outpost line. This outpost was under the command of Lieut.-Col. H. J. Dawson. Field kitchens accompanied each company and orders were issued that after 6 p.m., no fires or lights were to be used.

A muster parade of the 33rd Battery was held on Wednesday at 8.30 a.m. An exhibition rugby game, in which new players on both teams are being tried out, was called for this afternoon in the Royal Military college grounds between teams from the college and the 34th Battery.

Lieut. Stratton, 80th Battalion is in Toronto. Major Massie, O. C. 34th Battery, left on Tuesday night for Toronto to recruit more men for the battery.

Sergt. Thoms, A. M. C. of the Field Hospital staff had on Tuesday a visit from his wife who has just closed an engagement with a theatrical company at Syracuse, N.Y.

C. T. Cross, W. Bristow and G. T. Burke, all Kingstonians, have enlisted with Major Stroud in the 13th C. M. R.

A platoon of Russians from the 59th Battalion was given instruction in musketry at the ranges on Tuesday and according to the instructors did good work.

The 80th Battalion is receiving recruits from out-of-town places every day. On Tuesday five arrived from Belleville, four from Napanee, and three from the city enlisted with Lieut.-Col. Ketcheson.

Gunner Evans, 34th Battery, was kicked by a horse on Tuesday and had to be removed to the Military Hospital, Queen street, for treatment.

Gunner Hall, 33rd Battery, was removed to the City Hospital on Tuesday suffering from a severe attack of appendicitis.

J. W. Johnston, M. P. P. Belleville, was at the camp on Tuesday afternoon visiting his son, J. W. Johnston, junior who is a gunner in the 33rd Battery. It has just been announced that his son has secured his commission and will likely be attached to the 33rd Battery as he is a very capable young man.

Lieut. Bradshaw is acting quartermaster of "C" squadron, 13th C. M. R.

MEETING OF W.C.T.U. LADIES APPOINTED TO VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS.

Report of the Convention at Ottawa—Members To Attend Two Local Meetings On Saturday And Sunday Afternoons.

At the meeting of the Women's Christian Temperance Union held on Tuesday afternoon, the following ladies were appointed over various departments of the work: Mrs. Ross, systematic giving; Miss Sexsmith, work among sailors; Mrs. Kelly, unfermented wine; Mrs. S. Day, parlor meetings; Mrs. D. Purdy, anti-narcotics; Mrs. H. Lyon, evangelistic; Mrs. Spooner, prison and social reform; Miss De Witte, Mrs. Kelly, flower mission; Mrs. Brebner, temperance in Sunday schools; Mrs. J. Gardiner, missionary and lumber camps; Misses De Witte and Sexsmith with Mrs. Reynolds, railway employees; Mrs. Lyon, Mrs. Kelly, fair work; tidings and bulletin, Mrs. Fraser; press reports, Mrs. Halkett; Willard Home; Mrs. Wilson; mothers' meetings, Mrs. Stover, Mrs. Bateman.

It was announced that Mrs. Ann Gordon, Ottawa, would address a meeting for women on Sunday afternoon in the Y. W. C. A. parlors. The Women's Canadian Club also invited the W. C. T. U. to be present at their meeting next Saturday afternoon in Convocation Hall at three o'clock and hear at the same time Principal Gordon on "Some Aspects of the War As It Affects Women." It was decided to attend both of these gatherings.

The rest of the hour was spent in hearing a most interesting report by Miss De Witte at the 38th annual meeting of the Ontario Provincial W. C. T. U. held in Knox Church, Ottawa. There were 8,127 regular members reported with 632 honorary ones; \$30,254.81 had been received by the treasurer and expended on the work. Two Y. M. C. A. secretaries had been reported at the same time, one of these, Oscar Irwin, Toronto, had laid down his life for his country at Langemarck. At one of the evening sessions the mayor of Ottawa in extending the welcome of that city to the W. C. T. U. workers said that if he had the power he would forbid the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors in this province. Major-Gen. Sir Sam Hurley was also introduced to the convention and highly commended its members for the good work done by them for the soldiers which had been much appreciated by them.

A slight misunderstanding had arisen over the report of anti-narcotic superintendent. The press understood that the W. C. T. U. pledged itself against Red Cross work. The resolution that was carried read thus: "That while we double our diligence in all other forms of Red Cross and patriotic work, the members of the W. C. T. U. vote against such funds being used for the purchase of cigarettes for our Canadian boys at the front."

The W. C. T. U. workers could take no other ground as they have always had their efforts directed against the sale of tobacco to boys as well as the traffic in intoxicating liquors.

The provincial union also pledged its financial support to the committee of one hundred business men from both sides of politics, who were organizing a prohibition campaign to get a referendum submitted to the people of Ontario for the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

CONTRIBUTIONS MADE By Addition Municipalities For British Red Cross.

W. D. Black, M.P.P., in answer to the appeal of Lieut.-Governor Hendrie, solicited aid for the British Red Cross from the township councils of the riding of Addington, with the following results: Camden, \$500; Kaladar, \$100; Hinchinbrooke, \$100; proceeds of concert, \$35; Oddfellows at Parham, \$15; total for Hinchinbrooke, \$150; Kennebec, \$100; Clarendon and Miller, \$100.

The money is still coming in, and there is hope of one hundred dollars each from Sheffield, Olden, Geo. Denbigh and Newburgh. Mr. Black left on Sunday for Toronto with the money.

EDITH CAVELL CLUB
WAS ORGANIZED IN THE COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.
Will Help To Perpetuate the Memory of a Devoted Red Cross Nurse Who Was Slain By the Teutons.
On Tuesday afternoon the pupils of the Kingston Collegiate Institute organized for patriotic purposes under the name of the Edith Cavell Club, the name to commemorate the memory of the devoted Red Cross nurse who gave her life for her friends. The purpose of the organization is to further the interests of the charitable work in connection with the war, and to aid in providing comforts for the soldiers.
The name for the club was suggested by Trustee R. Meek, who sketched the work of the Red Cross nurse, her devotion to the soldiers of the Allies, and her death. Her name would ever be in history and her deeds recorded for all time to come.
The gathering was held in the assembly room of the Collegiate Institute. Every place in it was occupied. Trustee J. G. Elliott presided. Prof. Alexander Laird made a strong appeal for patriotic service at this time. The Institute will organize the club, select officers and devise plans for patriotic service.
