### FOR NOT TELLING WHO GAVE HIM THE LIQUOR.

Week's Regard Did Not Refresh the Memory of Napoleon Newell—Other Cases Before the Magistrate in Police Court.

A week's stay in the jail did not refresh Napoleon Newell's memory. Napoleon is on the "forbidden list," for tipplers, but last week went on a spree. When asked to give an account of how he secured the liquor, his memory went blank on him. He remembered being treated by a soldier, who bought a bottle which the two put away, and he also remembered that the soldier bought another bottle and gave it to him, but regarding the soldier he could give no particulars.

It was for this reason that the Magistrate sent him to jail. "I can't fix the blame," said Newell, when he bobbed up before the Magistrate. "While in jail I have been thinking the matter over, but it was no good."

"I'll give you one month," remarked the Magistrate, "and if in the meantime you can remember where you got the liquor, you can come before me and tell me."

William Williams was up for being drunk on Wednesday, but on that occasion, she stoutly denied the charge. Two constables were on hand, ready to tell all they knew about Annie's conduct on Tuesday night, but she changed her plea to one of "guilty."

"Just one more chance and I will never come here again," was her plea to the Magistrate.

However, the Magistrate had no faith in her promise, and imposed a fine of \$1 and costs or ten days. It was her third appearance before the court in a very short time.

Russell McLeod called out the Magistrate, but McLeod was conspicuous by his absence. Sergt. Snodden questioned three tipplers in the prisoner's box, but they all shook their heads and stated that it was not their names. Then it was found that the proper name was Russell McLeod, and as this name was called, a man stood up and saluted the Magistrate. Drunkenness was the charge, and he was assessed \$1 and costs.

McLeod blew into the town on a coal schooner. He did not stay to help unload the schooner, but "hiked" off to take on a few for himself.

William Mullinger is of the opinion that we are going to have a very hard winter. He has had a pretty good summer, but he is looking out for No. 1 for the winter months. He admitted being drunk, but wanted a chance to get into dry dock at Sudbury. If he covers a fine of \$1 and costs he will be able to clear for that port.

William Troy, who has been up before, and whose face was quite familiar to the Magistrate and court officials, was fined \$2 and costs of twenty days for being drunk.

#### Capt. Hartly To Command.

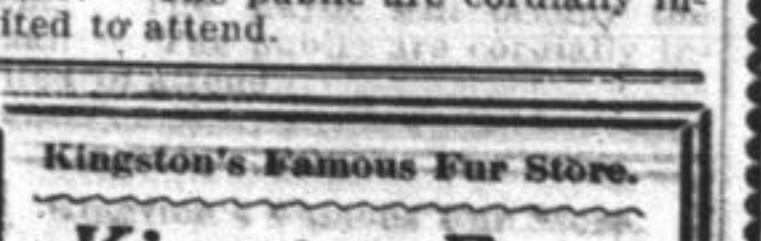
