inch material. The neck and armholes are bound with bands of self-material. or lace insertion may be substituted. Before attempting to cur the material fold it in half and smooth out all wrinkles. Right along the lengthwise fold place the back section (B); then next the front (A). The shield is laid opposite the back, and to the right of this are the bindings, two of which are parallel to the selvage edge of the material. After the sections are cut out clip the notches as they are indicated on the tissue, so that there will be no trouble in matching them when putting the undervest together.

Close the under-arm seams as notel ed as the first step in making the undervest; then turn the hem at the lower edge of small "o" perforations. Adjust the shield to position underneath the armhole in front and back, corresponding notches even. If desired, a layer of washable shielding may be used to protect the undergarments from excessive perspiration. Next, sew the bindings to the upper
