

## Serbian Resist Enemy's Advance On Nish

### TO SUPPLY SERBS WITH MUNITIONS

#### Through Montenegro--French Made Progress in Bulgaria--Allies' Submarines Operate in Sea of Marmora, Blocking Supplies For the Enemy.

(Special to the Whig.) Paris, Nov. 3.—Arrangements have been made to keep Serbia supplied with munitions through Montenegro. While the Serbian losses are said to have been moderate, in view of the desperate fighting, it has been necessary to destroy large quantities of war material to prevent it falling into the hands of the invaders.

The Bulgarians have not repeated their attacks upon Kriovak, which is held by the French. Evacuation of Monastir by the Serbs is denied.

A French man-of-war yesterday bombarded a Bulgarian supply train between Xantzi and Dedeaghat.

Both French and British submarines are now operating in the Sea of Marmora, preventing supplies from reaching the enemy's troops.

The Allies' monitors bombarded the Turks' Gallipoli positions. The Bulgarians give way. Berlin, Nov. 3.—Troops in the Nisava valley (through which the Bulgarians are seeking to reach Nish from the south) have given way before superior forces of the enemy.

### The Russians Gaining More Than Enemy

(Special to the Whig.) London, Nov. 3.—The Germans gained a little to-day in their drive on Riga from the west, Petrograd despatches admitted. Before Dvinsk, however, it was said that the Russians gained on the offensive.

In Volhynia, at the southern end of the Russo-German line, it was reported that the Germans had suffered huge losses in men.

### The Germans Held in Check In the East

London, Nov. 3.—The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says in a despatch: The German army is exhausted by five months' hard fighting under strange conditions, and is without hope of further accelerations of strength.

The delay on Germany's part means an open confession of weakness, and it is thus probable that the present calm means that Germany is gathering strength for a final and despairing effort.

## WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE DOWNED IN THREE OF THE STATES

### New York, Pennsylvania And Massachusetts Say "No"—A Republican Majority in the New York State Assembly.

(Special to the Whig.) New York, Nov. 3.—Woman suffrage was decisively defeated, a revised constitution rejected, and a Republican majority to the Assembly and three Republican congressmen were elected in New York State yesterday.

After the most extensive campaign ever made in any commonwealth in an effort to swing the population of 10,000,000 inhabitants into the "white" area of the map, the leaders of the movement in this state were forced to admit defeat by an overwhelming majority.
