DEATH INTERVENED.

Renfrew, Nov. 6.—In a letter home, Pte. "Red" Hartly tells of the grim irony of war in an incident associated with the death of Pte. S. J. Dempsey. The night before his death, a courier brought into the trenches letters from home. There was one for Pte. Dempsey, but as that night and as there was no candle handy to read it by, he put the letter by stating that he would read it the first thing in the morning. By the whim of war he met his death "the first thing in the morning." This pale—his death should so intervene even before he had read a last message from loved ones.

Gave Cheesemen a Banquet.

Belleville, Nov. 6.—The ninth complimentary banquet tendered by John Elliott, of the Standard Bank, to the members of the Belleville Cheese Board, was held Thursday afternoon at the Anglo-American Hotel. Mr. Elliott had as guests about one hundred and fifty. F. O'Flynn occupied the chair. Address dealing with the question of production and patriotism were given by Messrs. Elliott, W. Johnson, M.P.P., Nelson, Parliament M.P.P. for Prince Edward, and W. B. Roadhouse, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Ontario. The part played by the navy and ocean commerce in keeping Britain stocked with foodstuffs was referred to by several transportation agents.

Splendid Patriotic Spirit.

Napanee, Nov. 6.—Dr. and Mrs. C. E. Wilson have offered their beautiful home on Robert street, as a recreation club for the soldiers wintering in Napanee. It would be difficult to conceive a more suitable building for the purpose to which it is to be devoted. The club will be under the management of a committee of the Canadian overseas service entertainment for the soldiers and make them feel at home in our town. In fact the club, subject to certain restrictions, will be their home. There will be a reading room and a writing room, and Mrs. Wilson has kindly offered her piano, so there will be ample facility for musical entertainment.

A Patriotic Family.

Napanee, Nov. 6.—Canon Jarvis, Toronto, rector of Napanee, who is himself a veteran of the Fenian Raid of 1866, has now in England, his eldest son, Harry, who, only a sapper in the Canadian overseas army, has been offered and accepted a commission in the Royal Horse Artillery. Evidently Canadians are valued in the old land and nothing is too good for them. The Canon's second son, the Queen's Own Rifles and is now in training for overseas service, while George, the youngest and last, about to enlist, so Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis are surely doing their bit.

A Serious Accident.

Napanee, Nov. 6.—A serious accident happened to Mrs. Luke Young, Mill street, on Tuesday last. While engaged in washing her windows, she slipped and her arm coming in contact with a lamp reflector, was severely cut, severing an artery. Mrs. Young being alone in the house, and unable to stop the blood from flowing ran across the street for help. Dr. Vrooman and Stratton were soon on hand, and after putting their patient under chloroform, proceeded to take up the severed artery and closing the wound, which required seven stitches. Mrs. Young is improving, although quite weak from the loss of blood.

Another Industry Located.

Renfrew, Nov. 6.—Renfrew has caught the industrial fancy of another large industry, and the Council are now considering another proposition that runs into large figures. M. O'Brien was instrumental in getting this industry to consider Renfrew among other places, as a desirable town to locate their operations. This industry, it is understood, has a monthly pay-roll of \$18,000 and employs about three hundred hands. Their industrial needs are 60,000 gallons of water per day and 150 ft.

Changes at the Armouries.

Cobourg, Nov. 6.—This week Henderson Bros. have had a gang of carpenters putting in the bunks at the armouries and making changes for quarters. 250 men there this winter. In the large hall room upstairs four tiers of bunks, to accommodate 96 men, have been put in. In the lecture room at the front three tiers of bunks to accommodate 54 men have been put in, while in the smaller rooms upstairs, and downstairs, tiers of bunks have also been erected. The gun room of the 14th Field Battery downstairs on the west side is to be used as a mess room, while the gun room of the Heavy Battery has been transferred into a kitchen, store room, etc. A. R. Dundas has erected a large hot air furnace to heat the gun rooms, and has also placed large ranges in the cook-house.

An Old Cemetery.

Perth, Nov. 6.—There is a little cemetery of about twelve or fourteen mounds in the heart of the woods all grown up with pine, on the east half of lot 29 and 5th Concession of Dalhousie. We are told the pioneer settlers of eighty and ninety years ago are buried there, and families by the names of Proven and Paul are among them. There has not been any burials made there in over fifty years, but the mounds are all marked. In the early days there was only a trail through the woods to Lanark, and at that time few houses were to be seen in Perth. When the early settlers came to Lanark the government store presented them with an axe, auger, a pit saw and an adze. It is quite interesting to listen to stories related by some of the older inhabitants in the Dalhousie district.

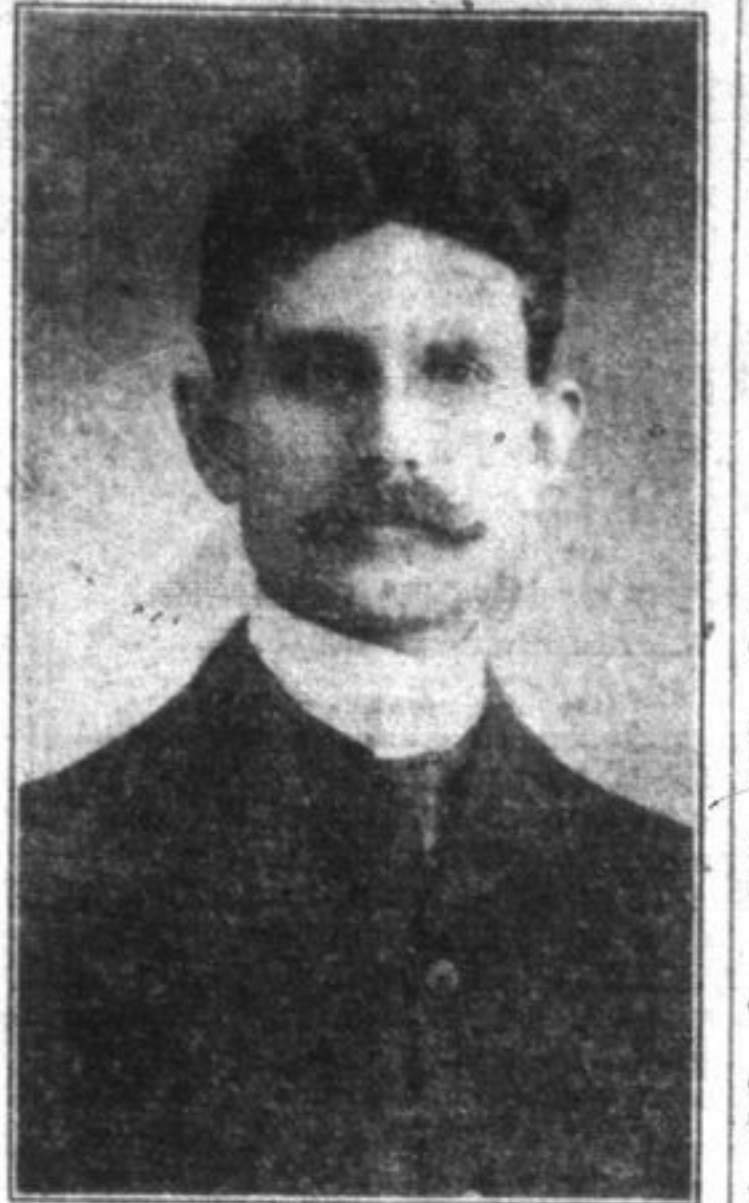
COMMISSION NOT RESPONSIBLE

For The Big Charges Made By The Hydro-Electric.

There is an erroneous impression that the Utilities Commission is responsible for incurring the \$1,593.48 charges made by the Hydro-Electric Commission for engineering services in connection with the Kingston plants. Of that amount \$861.47, more than half, was incurred by the Utilities Commission of the City Council in 1914 when Dr. A. E. Ross was Chairman. The idea prevailed that the Hydro-Electric Commission was giving its engineering services free, and when the Utilities Commission came into office in January, 1914, it thought likewise and had the Government Commission make a valuation of the gas, electric and water plants, for which \$677.24 was charged.

At the last regular meeting of the City Council, Ald. Nickle drew attention to the fact that the city was paying for everything the Government Commission did, and paying well, too.

It is understood that Mayor Sutherland will try and get Sir Adam Beck's department to return some of the \$1,593.48 for which Kingston has been charged.
