RAT ON THE SHOULDER

WHEN HE WOKE UP IN THE TRENCHES.

Pte. Salisbury Says He Is Only 100 Yards From the Germans — The Huns Have Lots of Nerve.

Mrs. F. J. Salisbury, 21 Sixth street, has received an interesting letter from her son at the front with the 21st Battalion. The letter reads in part as follows:

"I am writing this at night in my dug-out by the light of a candle and I think before I get finished I will have to go on guard again. It is very cold at nights here, especially when you have to pace up and down a narrow trench for two hours at a stretch and keep a sharp look-out that no enemy sticks his head over the parapet, for the Germans certainly have lots of nerve. There are only a little over a hundred yards apart where we are now.

"In these trenches we have to cook our own meals and the boys like it better as we seem to get more than when it was cooked for us. We also have certainly things that we never had before, like toast for breakfast and Welsh-rabbit for supper. Our trenches are in a turnip (or what we call a Belgian apple) field.

"We are in trenches now for eighteen days and I guess we will certainly need a bath and change of clothes when we get out.

"Our artillery has certainly been hitting the Germans pretty hard today. The Germans always seem to wait till supper-time to reply. When we go to sleep we usually have a few rats about the size of kittens jump up and down on our blankets. They are very affectionate, in fact the other night when I woke up there was a big rat sitting on my shoulder with his tail curled around my neck."
