**THE CANADIAN FORCES THAT ARE AT FRONT AND IN ENGLAND.**

Two Divisions Complete And the Corps Troops Are At the Front—Lieut.-Col. Rathbun Commands 4th Reserve Brigade.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—Additional details have reached Ottawa regarding the composition of the Canadian forces at the front and in training in England. The new Canadian army corps is composed of the first and second divisions, which are complete in themselves, and the corps troops, which consist of the Strathcona Horse, the Royal Canadian Dragoons, two brigades of Canadian Mounted Rifles, the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, the Forty-Second Montreal Battalion and the Forty-Ninth Edmonton Battalion.

General Alderson, as already announced, commands the corps. Among those attached to his staff is Major C. H. L. Beatty, D.S.G., a brother of Admiral Sir David Beatty.

Included in the Canadian training division in England are the troops of the cavalry depot, the reserve brigade of field artillery, the Eaton machine gun brigade, Canadian Engineers training depot, four brigades of infantry, the Army Service Corps training depot, various hospital and Canadian Army Medical Corps units, army veterinary units, ordnance corps units, a postal detachment and other small but important details.

The cavalry depot is in command of Lieut.-Col. R. W. Paterson, 34th Fort Garry Horse. Lieut.-Col. E. W. Rathbun, 9th Canadian Field Artillery Brigade, is in command of the 6th Reserve Brigade of Field Artillery, which forms the Canadian Artillery depot of the training division.

The Canadian Engineers training depot is in command of Lieut.-Col. J. Houlston, Halifax, N.S.

For their more effective administration and training the reserve infantry battalions of the Canadian training division have been organized into four new reserve brigades. They are constituted as follows: 7th Infantry Reserve Brigade, headquarters at St. Martin's Plain, Lieut.-Col. S. Maynard Rogers, brigade commander; 8th Infantry Reserve Brigade, headquarters at East Sandling, Col. J. P. Landry, brigade commander; 9th Infantry Reserve Brigade, West Sandling, Lieut.-Col. E. C. Ashton, brigade commander; 10th Infantry Reserve Brigade, headquarters at Shorncliffe, Lieut.-Col. H. J. Brown, brigade commander.

**IF THE HUNS WON.**

A Panic Would Happen in United States.

Boston, Nov. 9.—In reply to the query "What would be the significance to the United States if Germany won an overwhelming victory?" Prof. O. M. M. Sprague, of Harvard University, said: "A panic, swift and certain; probably the greatest in our history. A veritable financial chaos.

"The United States," Prof. Sprague went on, "would be in exactly the same position as any manufacturer who suddenly found himself unable to collect his bills, unable to raise the funds to carry on his business, and with the resultant loss of credit and confidence in the business. If Germany wins, and of course I have no such expectation,—her first act would be to demand an enormous indemnity.

"The Allies would be forced to either repudiate or defer indefinitely payment of their debts to the United States."

**MAY INFLUENCE KING.**

Skoulioudis Likely To Dissipate Constantine's Hesitancy.

London, Nov. 9.—The Daily Chronicle's diplomatic correspondent writes: "Skoulioudis is known to be friendly disposed to the Allies, and particularly to England, where he spent several years. He speaks English fluently, and, no doubt, will not take any step which is not in conformity with traditions in the best interest to Greece, and will always tender the best advice to his Sovereign. There is every reason to believe that the King will listen to Skoulioudis with greater attention than any other Greek statesman. It is, therefore, hoped that if the Allies continue preparations and military operations in the Balkans with vigor and speed, the time is not distant when, under the guidance of men like Skoulioudis, the hesitancy of King Constantine will disappear and Greece will join the Allies."

**SNOW IN BERLIN.**

Earliest Winter in Many Years—Women Clean Streets.

Rotterdam, Nov. 9.—Berlin already has had a heavy fall of snow. It is the earliest touch of wintry weather in many years. Women swept the snow from the streets.

Berliners, says the correspondent of the Rotterdam Courant, fear the troops in the field are insufficiently equipped with warm clothing.

**3 GERMAN SHIPS WRECKED.**

Off Swedish Coast in Evading British Submarines.

Stockholm, Nov. 9.—Marine advices state that six German ships have been wrecked on the Swedish coast in the last three days, while trying to escape British submarines. All the crews were lost.

German Girl Deserts Fiancee.

Bohn, Nov. 8.—The following advertisement, with a heart pant that discloses another phase of the horrors of the conflict, appears in a Berlin newspaper:

"Young soldier, after returning from the front with one arm amputated, is deserted by his fiancee because of this physical disablement. He would now like to get in touch with some woman, similarly afflicted, whose love for a man who served his country would remain true."

**TRADE WITH RUSSIA.**

Montreal Business Men Being Advised Of Opportunities.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—F. C. Just, special Canadian trade commissioner, who has only recently returned from Russia, where he investigated trade possibilities for Sir George Foster, is now in Montreal. After meeting Montreal business men Mr. Just will go east with a view to interesting Canadian manufacturers in the Russian market. He has already toured the Dominion from Victoria eastward and will now cover the rest of the province with special references to the possibilities for the sale of eastern manufactured products in the Czar's Empire.

It is Mr. Just's opinion that the Russian market presents great possibilities if Canadian manufacturers will study it, as there will be a strong sentiment against German trade for many years to come.

**LABOR'S RALLY TO FLAG.**

Remarkable Recruiting Demonstration Held in London.

London, Nov. 9.—A remarkable demonstration in furtherance of Lord Derby's recruiting campaign was held in Trafalgar Square Sunday by the trades unions of London. As a result, a large number of young men enlisted with the Independent Clapham branch of the Independent Labor Party, which declined to participate, all the unions in London sent representatives, and an immense crowd gathered in the square.

Resolutions adopted at the meeting reaffirmed labor's conviction that the voluntary system of enlistment would meet the needs of the country and pledged devoted support of Lord Derby's campaign "in order to bring the war to a successful issue, and to prevent the establishment in the country of the conscriptionists military and naval system."

**THE SPORT REVIEW**

According to the Hamilton Spectator the Tigers will not play off with the O. R. F. U. winners for the Canadian final unless the proceeds are donated to patriotic purposes.

Any peace overtures will have to come from the National Hockey Association, declared President Frank Patrick, of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association.

The executive committee of the Sarnia O. R. F. U. Intermediate team has accepted the offer of the Hamilton Rowing Club intermediates for a sudden death game to be played at Sarnia on Saturday, Nov. 13th. This is the semi-final game for the championship.

Never before in the history of Rugby will so many well known and popular athletes be gathered together on one field as will be seen in action when the teams from Kingston and Toronto encampments get together in the military match next Saturday.

Arrayed alongside of Maynard will be the ex-Queen's star, "Tou" Leckie, who also performed with Hamilton Tigers and the Argos in many a famous gridiron contest. Leckie is a star punter, and was always rated as one of the best in the game.

Toronto News: They have championships galore in all branches of sport in the Kingston battery, and they are making good at the rugby game. "Bob" Dibble, the big husky rowing champion played a fair game for the Argos last year, and is no novice, while Knowlson, the champion paddler, is also doing as well with the rugby ball as he did with the paddle.

This evening in Montreal the directors of the National Hockey Association will meet in conference for consideration of legal measures to prevent the Patriots from using the services of six players of the Toronto hockey club who have been, according to Patrick's announcement, in Vancouver, signed by the western magnates.

Coach Alf Smith of the Ottawa hockey team has announced that George Boucher and "Eddie" Nagle, the crack youngsters of the Ottawa football team, had both consented to a trial with the Senators on the ice this winter. Smyth thinks both boys are good prospects. Boucher is a wing player with a shot from the left side and should be able to fill Broadbent's shoes in a year or two. He is fast and carries a "low shot" from the boards as well as a good snap in close. Nagle is very fast and a plugger in centre ice.

The Toronto Riversides have again decided to enter the senior O. H. A. series, and their prospects look bright for a strong team, as they have several new men in line along with Eugene Dopp, last year's captain; Gordon Applegath, Ken Crane, Pete Reesor, and Cecil Hill.

Out of a club membership of 142, over 60 per cent. have enlisted for active service, but the Riversides are still in the ring and a very active sporting organization.

It is announced that the Thousand Islands Yacht Club has offered a perpetual challenge cup which will be raced for each summer on the St. Lawrence River by motor boats. The conditions to govern the races for this trophy will be the same as those governing the noted gold cup races, except that the cup must be returned to the yacht club within 30 days before the next series of races to take place during the year following a gold medal. The first year will receive a gold medal. The first of the new series of races will be held in August of next year, and a large number of boats are expected to compete for the valuable prize, which in value exceeds the Gold Challenge Cup.

**THE JAPANESE WATCH**

PASSING OF THE EMPEROR TO BE CROWNED

The Narrow Streets of Kyoto, the Ancient Capital of Japan, Thronged With People.

Kyoto, Japan, Nov. 9.—Through narrow streets packed to suffocation with eager crowds, who had stood wedged in uncomfortable positions for many hours, the Emperor of Japan passed in full state yesterday morning to the ancient capital of Nippon in this city, where the ceremonies of the coronation will take place.

As the Imperial shrine was carried by the immense throngs prostrated themselves and worshipped. The people were quiet and orderly. The Emperor's face was extremely serious. He had spent the night at Nagoya in order to avoid the fatigue of a twelve-hour railroad journey.

An interesting ceremony was performed in connection with the temporary reception of the Imperial treasures. These were a once-borne to a shrine which had been erected to house them during the coronation, and were enshrined with full Shinto ritual, including the offering of food and wine.

The Master of Rituals recited an ancient prayer, and representatives of the Emperor and Empress attended and made obeisance to the relics. The Emperor himself was not present. He will rest in the palace until the coronation takes place on Wednesday.

One result of the unprecedented influx is that it is impossible to obtain a vehicle of any description. All the rickshaws and carriages were engaged months ago by Japanese, and those who neglected to make special provision have to walk or take the street car for long distances. Magnificent uniforms are in evidence everywhere, and the streets are a continual pageant of gold lace and color.

**MEMORIAL SERVICES.**

Held in Winnipeg For Late Sir Charles Tupper.

Winnipeg, Nov. 9.—Memorial services for the late Sir Charles Tupper were held here Sunday night in All Saint's Church, Rev. Walter Loucke officiating and preaching. He made reference to the life and work of Canada's former premier and former high commissioner at London. The present Sir Charles Tupper and Lady Tupper, W. J. Tupper, wife and family were in attendance. Hon. Robert Rogers represented the Dominion Government, and others present were Premier Norris, Hon. Edward Brown, Hon. A. B. Hudson, of the Provincial Government, Mayor Wauchope, Lady Cameron and W. J. Christie and E. L. Taylor, representing the Conservative Association of Manitoba.

**TO SEND MORE MEN.**

Island Of Jamaica Needs The King's Call.

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 9.—The members of the legislature had a conference yesterday, when they met Governor Manning, and submitted proposals for increasing the Jamaican contingent at the front, and expressed their willingness to bear increased taxation for that purpose.

They sent a cablegram to King George, expressing the people's regret of his illness and assuring him Jamaica would give hearty response to his appeal for men.
