REVENUE FROM MOVIES

PROVINCE AND DOMINION PROFIT BY GREAT NEW INDUSTRY

Contribution of Film Business to the Affairs of the Dominion in Duty Alone Amounts to Nearly Eight Thousand Dollars a Week—Fees From Licenses.

THAT the motion picture business has become a great industry is well known. But probably few people are aware of the amount which that business is responsible for contributing to the coffers of the Dominion, and of the various Provinces—exclusive of the license fees paid by each motion picture theatre and which go to swell the finances of the Province in which the particular motion picture theatre is situated.

The largest item is, of course, that in respect of the duty payable on the reels of film that come into this country—practically all of them from the United States. On every such reel there is a duty payable of \$25.50.

Thus, with each reel-paying a duty of \$25.50 these 300 reels are responsible for the payment between them of the very large sum of \$7,650 a week in duty.

So far the amounts payable being all in respect of duties go to the coffers of the Dominion Government. In addition, each reel has to be censored in each Province in which it is exhibited, and a fee of \$1.50 has to be paid to the Provincial censors in respect of this work for each reel censored.

As regards the motion picture theatres the employment which they furnish is of considerable magnitude. It would be difficult to estimate the total number of "movie" theatres in the Dominion. But in Toronto alone there are 85 of them.

SHRAPNEL'S GRANDSON.

Descendant of Famous Soldier is an Artist in Victoria, B.C.

When an inexperienced girl meets a man of forty with a bald head she generally looks upon him as being old. This was the impression on the writer had the day she took her first painting lesson from Edward Scroppe Shrapnel, A.R.C.A., 1578 Olive Drive, Oak Bay, Victoria, B.C., formerly of the teaching staff of Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. A few weeks ago, hearing that my teacher was still in the land of the living, I had a keen desire to meet him once more, so started out to look for him.

After numerous directions from the man on the tram-car, and several pedestrians as well, I found the artist and his family comfortably housed on Olive Drive, a very romantic spot, such as an artist would choose. I did not find a man "ninety and feeble," but one just seventy-two and bright as a dollar.

Strange to say, as I approached the home, I noticed the professor and a photographer busy getting a picture from a large portrait, which was that of his father, Major H. N. S. Shrapnel, to be reproduced later with that of his great-grandfather, General Shrapnel, inventor of the shrapnel shell so much in use to-day in warfare.

Mr. E. M. Shrapnel left Whitby twenty-four years ago to live in Victoria. He was founder of the Vancouver Art Association. In those days he made weekly trips to Vancouver to teach his pupils. He is known far and wide in Canada, having taught hundreds of boys and girls to study nature by means of drawing and painting.

A Mormon's Sons. The proudest Mormon in Canada is undoubtedly R. Savage, of Glenwood, in the Mormon colony south of Macleod, in Alberta. This man has no less than three husky sons, being for Britain on sea and land in Europe and Asia.

Harold Savage is but 19 years of age, and is stoker on H.M.S. Lord Nelson, a battleship cruising the North Sea. The lad is a member of the Salvation Army, and writes his father: "I'm all right; glad if we are blown up, I go straight to glory."

Bugler Walker was in Edmonton when the war broke out and soon after enlisted for active service and trained at Valcartier and Salisbury Plains with the first Canadian contingent. While in the latter place he was selected to give the last call for the old year, 1914, and the first call for 1915.

SON OF A POLICEMAN.

Sir Thomas Snaughnessy Never Takes Business Home With Him.

"I make it a rule of my life never to take my business cares home with me. The busiest man should be able to do his work in business hours, and have his evenings free for home and family."

Thus spoke Sir Thos. Snaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, who has been appointed Organizer of Munitions in Canada. Sir Thos. is a man whose business maxims should hit and stick, for he knows the secrets of success. Of humble parentage, he started life in the office of the Milwaukee & St. Paul Line, and steadily rose until he achieved the distinction of becoming president of the Canadian Pacific, the largest railway in the world, at the age of 46.

Besides being the largest landowner in the world, it owns and controls the telegraph wires, 70,000 miles of telegraph wires, several huge hotels, mines, lumber works, fleets of steamers, an emigration bureau, and employs something like 70,000 hands.

SEED CENTRES.

Movement in Aid of Canadian Farmers a Great Success.

During the past ten years special efforts have been put forth throughout Canada to increase the production and to facilitate the distribution of high class seed of our ordinary farm crops. For this end the Canadian Seed Growers' Association was organized in 1904.

After several years' experience, it was found that the number of farmers who would take this care in improving and maintaining the purity of their seed stocks was comparatively small, with the result that the amount of seed originating from these special selections was much below the demand.

The results to date on the whole are most encouraging, and those closely associated with the movement look forward to seeing the whole seed question revolutionized. By means of this system buyers will be able to purchase in carload lots and directly from growers if they so desire.
