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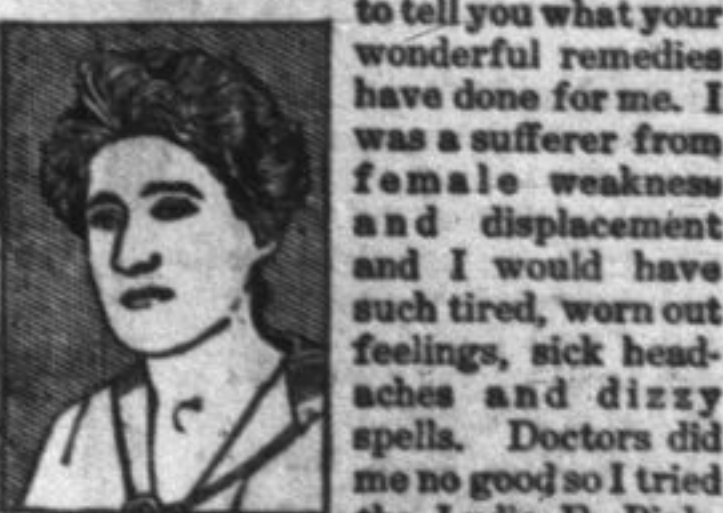

## DOGS TAKE A PART

IN THE WORK IN THE GERMAN ARMY.

About Four Thousand Canines Are Said To Be On the Register—The German Sheep Dogs Are Very Much in Evidence.

The following information has been taken from an article appearing in the Bulletin of the Saint Hubert Club de France, and written by Dr. Humbert, a member of the club, now in charge of the hospital at Bussang: Ever since the Germans attacked a team of dogs to each Jager (rifle) battalion, the employment of dogs in the German army has steadily increased, thanks to the close co-operation of the military authorities with practical dog men. Foremost in this respect is the Verein für Deutsche Schäferhund (German Sheepdog Club), founded in 1889, and now having more than 4,000 members. This society, whose studbooks contain up to now about 45,000 entries, also keeps a special register "in view of mobilization." While already in the studbooks the entry of each dog is accompanied by an abbreviated indication whether the sheepdog in question has been trained for police duty, ambulance work, patrol work, or domestic duties, this special war register gives a more detailed information on the same points.

About 4,000 dogs are said to be on the register, which is carefully kept up to date. Side by side with the German Sheepdog Club exists the German Club for Ambulance Dogs, specializing, as its name indicates, in the breeding and training of dogs suitable for retrieving wounded soldiers. The dogs kept by members of the two societies form the reserve of the canine units of the German army, and their owners were warned shortly before the mobilization to hold them in readiness for requisition by the army.

While the Jager battalions specialize in the employment of dogs for patrol and sentry duty, they are employed by other regiments as well, up to ten dogs being attached to each battalion. The ambulance detachments, which form part of each German regiment, have generally four ambulance dogs that are taken out at the same time as the stretcher-bearers go out. The breeds chiefly employed are the so-called German sheepdog—they actually come from Alsace and Switzerland—the Doberman Pinscher, the Alsatian, the pointer and more rarely the Rottweiler, a kind of cattle dog, and the boxer, which latter has a long strain of bulldog in him.

**Photographs on the Wing.**  
Germany has employed many ingenious devices in the Great War, and surely one of the most unique is that of employing carrier pigeons for taking military photographs. Some years ago the camera employed for this purpose was exhibited in Germany. It was invented by Dr. Neubronna, and was a wonderfully light instrument, weighing only 2 1/2 oz. The lens was only 2 in. focus, and the photograph produced measured 1 3/16 in. square. One of the models could take eight pictures in succession on a film, while another consisted of two distinct cameras. The lens of one pointed forwards and the other backwards when the "carrier" was in flight. In each case the exposure mechanism consisted of a rubber bulb containing compressed air, by the slow escape of which through a minute aperture a lever was operated to release the shutter at the end of an interval of time which could be determined in advance.

**A Joke That Recalled.**  
Professor Ikeno of Tokio university is well known for his absent-mindedness. One evening on his way from school, says the East and West News, he struck his head against a telegraph post. "Pardon me, pardon me," he said, and quickened his gait. A certain colleague of the same university happened to see this from the other side of the street, and the following day said to the professor: "I was surprised last night by your carelessness, Mr. Ikeno. You dashed against me in the street and I feel the pain still."  
"Oh, was it you?" was the reply. "Please excuse me. I did not know it was you. It felt wooden." Then a row at last, and round the professor's room, but at the expense of the colleague.

**Amazing Appetites.**  
If a baby had the appetite of a young potato beetle it would eat from fifty to one hundred pounds of food every twenty-four hours. If a horse ate as much as a caterpillar, in proportion to its size, it would consume a ton of hay every twenty-four hours. A caterpillar eats twice its weight of leaves every day; but a potato beetle devours every day at least five times its weight in foliage, every bit of which represents just so much money to the farmer.

The most destructive of all insects, however, is the grasshopper, which, when in good health, consumes in a day ten times its weight of vegetation. No wonder that whole districts are devastated by its multitudinous swarms.
