Capt. Stothers, Ottawa, brought down twenty-two recruits for the 32nd Battery on Monday. Of 125 men that Ottawa was asked to raise for this unit, thirty-five have already been accepted.

There is a movement on foot to form a battalion of infantry in this division made up of ex-school-cadets. Capt. E. E. Snider, principal of the Fort Hope High School, is behind the movement and it is understood that his suggestion is meeting with the hearty approval of the Militia Department. A battalion of 1,000 ex-cadets, all between the ages of eighteen and twenty-three, would undoubtedly be among the best disciplined and smartest appearing of units. Although nothing official could be learned, it is thought that Major G. H. Gillespie, O. and I. of Cadet Corps, who has been so intimately connected with the work, would be appointed officer commanding.
