ALLIES ARE DRIVING TOWARDS STRUMNITZA

The French Have Occupied Kosturino in Bulgaria--The Russian Offensive Under Gen. Ruszky West of Riga is Still Continuing.

Russians Still On Offensive. (Special to the Whig.) London, Nov. 18.—There is no change on the Russian front, but the presence of Russian warships on the coast of Courland, where they have been bombarding the German positions, suggests that General Ruszky has not concluded the offensive which he undertook west of Riga.

Bulgars Occupy Priep. London, Nov. 18.—A despatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Athens, dated Wednesday, says: "Official war despatches are still lacking, but according to press despatches received here Priep is said to have been occupied by the Bulgarians, who are now two hours distant from Monastir, and making a turning movement under command of German officers.

CANADIANS WERE LIKELY IN A SURPRISE ATTACK

Toronto, Nov. 18.—The German official statement declares that British troops between Armentieres and Messines attempted a surprise attack which failed. In this the Canadians are interested, for 40,000 of our troops occupied that six miles stretch of line for months and were there when their position was last clearly located.

German Mine Likely Sank Hospital Ship

London, Nov. 18.—Discussing the loss of the hospital ship Anglia, the Daily Mail says: "The mine may have been laid by one of the German submarines or by some submerged neutral vessel. "It was no doubt to prepare the world for such an episode that last Friday the German wireless published a report that British hospital ships were being used for the conveyance of troops and munitions of war.

War Relics Explode. Rome, Nov. 18.—While the United States Red Cross mission was on its way from Belgrade to Vienna yesterday, loaded shells carried by Dr. Edward W. Ryan, head of the anti-typus corps in Serbia, exploded, accidentally at the Budapest station, creating a panic and slightly wounding several onlookers.

Will Wed a Doctor. Berlin, Nov. 18.—According to the Lokal Anzeiger, the Archduchess Isabella Marie, daughter of Archduke Frederick, commander-in-chief of the Austrian army, is about to marry a commoner, having promised her hand to Professor Paul Albrecht, a Vienna physician.

TORONTO OFFICER KILLED BY A FALL

Lieut. Gordon Stewart Andrews Thrown Off on Catarqui Bridge Early Thursday Morning--Died On Way to Hospital.

Lieut. Gordon Stewart Andrews, Toronto, was killed as a result of a fall from his horse on the Catarqui bridge on Thursday morning. The deceased was one of the officers attending the present course of the Royal School of Artillery at Tete de Pont Barracks, and at 6 a.m. took the usual ride to Barriefield under Lieut. Dick, in which only a saddle and strap are used as a seat.

While crossing the bridge his horse took fright at a passing vehicle and gave a lurch that threw the rider to the floor of the bridge. The horse's feet became entangled in those of the officer and the animal also fell, his hip striking the officer on the chest and head. Lieut. Andrews was bleeding from the mouth and nose when picked up. A military wagon was passing and the dying officer was put into it and rushed to the General Hospital. A call was sent to Major R. J. Gardiner. When the wagon arrived at the Hospital, Lieut. Andrews was dead. Major Gardiner and Dr. D. E. Mundell took evidence on the case.

Serbian Army In the North May Escape

FRENCH BOMBARDMENT Of German Trenches Along The Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 18.—A concentrated French bombardment of the German trenches in the Somme region, in the vicinity of the Hebecourt quarries, and in the Aisne district, about Antreches, were reported in to-day's official communique. A violent artillery duel is progressing also in the Boise-Givenchy region in the Artois.

Sunk By a Mine. (Special to the Whig.) Amsterdam, Nov. 18.—The Norwegian steamship Ulriken, 2,379 tons, New York to Rotterdam, has been sunk by a mine. Five of the crew perished.
