FURIOUS FIGHTING

At Many Points Along the Western Front.

(Special to the Whig) Paris, Nov. 20.—Furious artillery and grenade fighting at many points on the Franco-German front is reported to-day in the War Office statement.

No development is mentioned, however, indicating the opening of a fresh German drive, for which Copenhagen reports say the Kaiser is transferring immense numbers of troops from the eastern to the western war zone.

The fighting referred to in the official communique was the fiercest in the vicinity of the Labyrinth, in the Artois district, about Courtes, Chaussees and Vauquois, in the Argonne, and in the neighborhood of Reillon, in Lorraine.

NO NEGRO REGIMENT.

Colored Men Are Welcome in The Battalions.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—"Most assuredly colored men are eligible for the Canadian army," said Gen. Hughes this morning. "We have scores of them in regiments through the Dominion. In Toronto there are a great many, and one of the best sergeants we have there is a colored man. But you may say the Minister of Militia will not yield to the fact to give the colored men a regiment of their own any more than he will consent to the formation of a regiment of one-eyed men, yellow-moustached men, or red-headed men."

WILL REQUIRE TREATMENT

In Convalescent Homes For From Three to Twelve Months.

(Special to the Whig) Quebec, Nov. 20.—Seventy-five per cent. of the soldiers who returned to Canada from the front will require convalescent treatment for indefinite periods ranging anywhere from three months to twelve months or more.

PUSHING AHEAD.

Will Have a Hundred Carpenters on the Job.

Renfrew, Nov. 20.—The new industry, that is the very latest one, has made as rapid strides as its predecessor. Already the forms for the foundation work of its eleven buildings are down. Four buildings have been constructed and there is a gang there now of about 160 men. It is expected that by next week the field will be clear for the carpenters, and one hundred or more are expected.

FOR OVERSEAS.

"Jim" Morrison Enlists With 32nd Battery.

Renfrew, Nov. 20.—J. Morrison has enlisted with the 32nd Battery. "Jim," the popular young man from the land of Harry Vander, who was recently employed in Stewart's Limited, is the latest Renfrew boy to don the khaki. Mr. Morrison was a valuable member of the Citizens' Band, which organization has now said "au revoir" to eleven of its members, who have gone to the war.

Tweed, Nov. 20.—A very pretty dancing party under the auspices of the Tweed Maids was given in the New Opera House on Thursday evening last. The hall decorations were extremely handsome, and won many encomiums. The floor, which is admittedly one of the finest, was in perfect condition. The music was of high order. Guests were present from Stirling, Belleville, Peterboro, Havelock and Madoc. Those who did not wish to join in the light fast-tastic found pleasure at the card tables. At midnight a dainty luncheon was served. The proceeds netted about \$30 for the Patriotic Fund.

Eastern Ontario Library Association.

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The Eastern Ontario Library Association is holding its annual meeting in the Carnegie Library. Forty delegates from all parts of the eastern counties are assembled to discuss matters pertaining to their work, such as the extension of the reading of good literature among pupils in the schools and among the people in general. Several papers will be read, but there will be no public lecture this year. Rev. D. O. McArthur, of Iroquois, is president of the association, and Miss Jessie Sproule, of Ottawa, is secretary.

Cornwall, Ont., Nov. 20.—George Brownrigg has added another horse to his racing stable. The new addition is the pacing mare Pato, with a record of 2:16 1/4, made at Malone, N.Y., in the \$1,000 stake, when she defeated a field of ten horses. She won the fifth heat in 2:10 1/4, the fastest heat in the race. Pato was purchased three years ago in Chicago at the horse show by Dan Donnelly, of Montreal.

Had Close Call.

Westport, Nov. 20.—J. B. Leuder narrowly escaped death on Thursday in his planing mill. He was putting a belt on the main shaft when his jacket was caught in the rotating tearing his clothes into shreds. A set screw on one of the pulleys tore the flesh off the back of his hand. The only thing saving him from being mangled was the fact that the pulley was loose. He is recovering nicely.

Each town and village in these counties will be asked to contribute men to the formation of the 130th Battalion, whose headquarters will be at Perth.

Perth, Nov. 20.—Thomas J. Devlin shipped 42 horses to Ottawa for war purposes for the French Government, and went down himself to attend the inspection. Only seventeen were accepted. The inspection was very rigid. A horse is thrown out for slight blemishes, for troubles it was hard to find by the casual observer.—Perth Expositor.
