## WHIG'S TOBACCO FUND

THE NEED FOR THE WEED IS STILL URGENT.

The United States To Be Organized At the Request of the King of the Belgians.

The British Whig's Tobacco Fund continues to grow. To-day we publish the details of collections made by Miss Aldeen Elmer, Miss M. Aubin, city, T. E. Our thanks are due to these people for their work in this connection, and we are sure the Canadian soldiers at the front will most heartily appreciate their endeavors.

The need for tobacco is still urgent. Mr. Jones, the organizer of the Overseas Club for Canada, telephoned the Whig from Montreal the other night that the demand for tobacco far exceeded the supply. Mr. Jones was then on his way to New York, acting on instructions from King Albert of Belgium, to organize in the United States a fund for the collection of tobacco for Belgian soldiers. The people of the United States have done magnificently in supplying funds for tobacco for Canadians at the front. There is still room for the receipt of further donations, which the Whig Office would be pleased to receive, and acknowledge free of charge.

#### For Dominion of Canada War Loan.

Howard S. Folger, Broker, has received advice from the Finance Department of Ottawa that a supply of prospectuses and applications forms in connection with the Dominion Government War Loan will be forwarded to reach him Monday, November 22nd, when full information will then be available to the public. On account of the high class of this security, its probable generous interest yield and worthy object, there is no doubt that the entire loan will be subscribed in a very short time. Although not officially announced it is generally expected that the Bonds will be 5 per cent's, but issued to the public at a rate to yield in the neighborhood of 5 1/2 per cent. Bonds to run ten years, and in denominations of \$100, \$50, and \$1,000.

Mr. Folger requests us to announce that he is authorized by the Government to receive subscriptions and will be pleased to furnish prospectuses and application blanks to all those desiring to subscribe and will send such applications to the Dominion Government and deliver Bonds at Kingston to purchasers without charge.

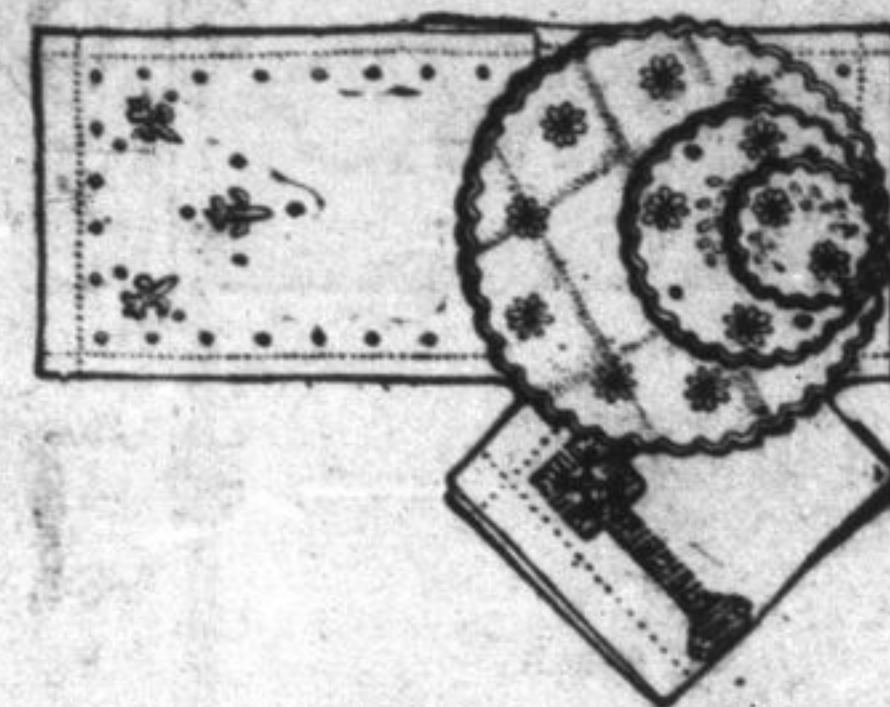
