Of the Gendarmerie Against the Shah's Government.

(Special to the Whig.) Red Cross Work London, Nov. 23.—Persian Gen-Shah's Government, have made prisoners of the British consul at Shiraz, and the English manager of the Imperial Bank of Persia, Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey announced in House of Commons to-day. The two Englishmen's imprisonment has been reported before, but the gendarmeries revolt was fresh information. The gendarmerie is officered by foreigners, including many Germans. EXPORTABLE WHEAT 228,132,000 BUSHELS

This is Nearly Sixty-Eight Per Cent. of Total Crop of 1915.

Ottawa, Nov. 23.-According to an official estimate of the wheat yield in Canada this year, out of total yield of 336,258,000 bushels there will be an exportable surplus of 228,132,000 bushels. The average loss in cleaning and allowance of 10 per cent, for grain not of merchantable quality is estimated at 33,625, 000 bushels. The total amount retained for seeding next year's crop, say 14,000,000 acres at 1,75 bushels per acre, is placed at 24,500,000 bushels. The amount required for food, averaging 6.25 bushels pe head, is estimated at 50,000,000 bushels. The quantity of wheat and for export is \$5,558,000 bushels in excess of the previous high record of 1913-1914, and represents nearly 68 per cent, of the total production
