SCHOOL OF NAVIGATION OPENS AT QUEEN'S ON THE 14TH OF DECEMBER.

Capt. H. M. McMaster Will Be in Charge—Prof. A. L. Clark and D. Buchanan Will Give Course of Special Lectures. The second session of the School of Navigation at Queen's University will open Tuesday, December 14th, and continue for three months. The school will be open without charge to all seamen who desire to be instructed in navigation and seamanship, and will especially prepare for the examinations for certificates as coasting master, coasting mate, inland master, inland mate, minor master, minor mate, tug boat captain.

All work necessary for the various grades will be taught and the school will be in charge of Capt. H. M. McMaster, assistant superintendent Montreal Transportation Company, who has not only had an extensive experience as master, but has also been highly successful in training for the above-mentioned certificates. During the course of the session a series of five lectures or talks on electrical and magnetic effects in the earth and atmosphere, including storms and weather predictions, will be given by A. L. Clark, Ph.D., professor of physics, and also five lectures or talks on practical astronomy by D. Buchanan, Ph.D., associate professor of mathematics. The examinations for the different certificates will be conducted in Kingston by Capt. H. W. King, Dominion Supervisor of Marine Examinations.

The Magistrate has not been able to get the information he wanted, and on this account, was compelled to further enlarge the case.

THE Y. M. C. A. IS DOING MORE WORK THAN EVER.

All Its Privileges Given to Overseas Men—It Appeals To the Citizens to Help the Good Work Along.

There never was a time in its history that the existence of the local Young Men's Christian Association was more justified than in its present additional capacity as a soldier's club. For the past year or more the boys in khaki who have been quartered in the city and on Barrfield Heights have been given free special privileges in the local association, including use of writing room, reading room, music room, etc. Thousands of sheets of writing paper and envelopes have been supplied free to all who took advantage of writing home from the building. All the soldiers who desire to come in when the regular classes are on, are given the bath and gymnasium privileges at a greatly reduced rate. In addition, a number of the officers have taken advantage of the association's offer to parade their whole companies to the building and have used the shower and swimming baths without cost and in an appreciative manner. During the time the National Council in charge of the military "Y" at Barrfield, the local association had many opportunities of co-operating, especially in its religious work programme and in so doing has kept up a valuable contact with the men in uniform.

Not only are the soldiers given a cordial welcome by the Board of Directors and executive staff, but the members have responded in a splendid way by not only continuing their memberships but many times gladly stepping aside and sacrificing privileges in favor of their soldier friends, many of the latter are members in the four associations of Toronto, Belleville, Peterboro, Ottawa, and while the burden has been a little heavier financially the directors of the local Y. M. C. A. have gladly honored the tickets of these men and given them every privilege afforded the local members.

Plans are under way for a more extensive programme of work especially along social lines for these men, and these facts are pointed out in order that the friends of the association when not by other many good appeals on their time and support may not neglect this equally important and much appreciated work.
