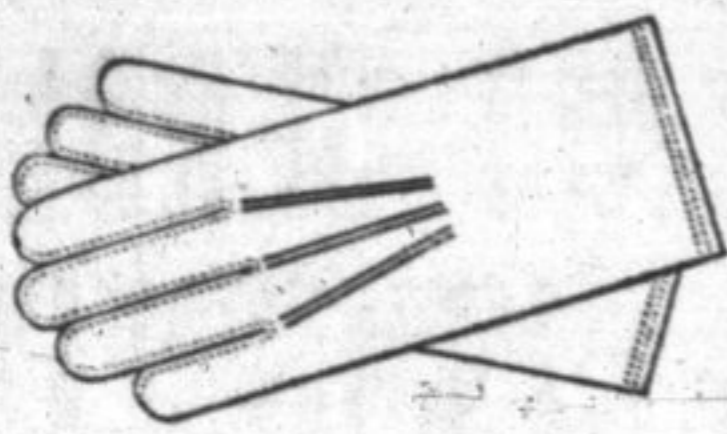

GRANTS MADE TO THE CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS

Children's Aid Society—Was Given \$25 Extra As Result of Strong Appeal of Deputation—Strong Objection to Report of the Valuator.

The Frontenac County Council, at its session on Friday morning was notified of the Traffic Bills which are now before the Ontario Legislature, and which it is intended will regulate the weight of loads to be taken over the roads.

Anthony Rankin, M.P.P., addressed the Council, stating that the bills would be taken up by the Legislature at its next session. Circulars had been sent out to the various municipalities, in order that suggestions might be secured. Each constituency knew its own conditions. He believed that action would be taken which would provide protection for the roads. The idea is to regulate the heavy motor traffic which results in the cutting up of the roads.

The Good Roads Committee of the Council will take up the matter, and report.

Lorenzo Rutan, through his solicitor, asked the Council to take steps to have a water course on the York road, near Harrowsmith changed, as it damaged his property. The matter will be considered.

On motion of Councillors Halliday and Spankie, the following grants were made: Infants' Home, \$175; Orphans' Home, \$175; Mowat Memorial Hospital, \$500; Children's Aid Society, \$200.

The only increase is that made to the Children's Aid Society. The Society was formerly given a grant of \$175. A deputation from the society appeared before the Council on Wednesday afternoon, and appealed for more money to carry on the good work.
