A SPLENDID PARADE

WAS AN EVENT ON SATURDAY MORNING.

The First Since Barricfield Camp Broke Up—It Was in Honor of the Australian Cadets.

A garrison parade—the first since Barricfield Camp broke up in which were 2,500 soldiers training for overseas service, was held on Saturday morning in honor of the Australian cadets. The parade assembled at the Cricket Field at 8.45 a.m., and marched to the City Hall, where Col. T. D. H. Hemming, D.O.C., took the salute. The parade was headed by the R. C. H. A. band, and following this band was "C" Battery, under Capt. W. E. Steacy, "G" Squadron, C.M.R., under Major W. Alan Strout, the 32nd Battery, under Major S. A. McKenzie, the 33rd Battery, under Major W. Sears, the 34th Battery, under Major R. F. Massie, and the 59th Battalion, under Major C. C. Cameron.

The soldiers looked splendid as they went past the saluting base, marching as a solid body, with no breaks in steps or other mistakes that would spoil the general appearance. It is difficult to say which unit looked the best, as they were all fine.

Concert in City Hall.
One of the best entertainments ever put on here was given Friday night in the City Hall, when the Australian Cadets, before a full house, gave a varied programme of two hours. Every minute something there was new and good. If the Cadets are a fair sample of the average Australian lad, Canadian educationalists have something to learn about school methods. Full justice could not be done to parts for lack of room and staging. As it was they certainly made a hit. Mayor Sutherland will have over \$100 to hand to the Red Cross Fund as part of the receipts.

A remarkable feature was the gymnastic display by a squad of six cadets. The "boy" featuring in the band, in comic sketches and recitations, showing that stout muscles, steady nerves and lithe movements went with a good education, too.

On two parallel poles, boys averaging seventeen years of age exhibited walking forward and backward on their hands with their feet in the air and bodies straight as rods. Many kinds of human pyramids were made, reaching almost to the ceiling, with a little "shaver" only twelve years of age on the top "storey." The Whig was assured this was a regular feature and fair exhibition of the average Australian pupil; that it was a part of every boy's regular training under their system.

"Bobbie" Frew is a miniature of Harry Lauder and brought down the house with his Scotch songs. "Colossus" and "Il Trovatore" in a wonderful manner while a cornet solo by G. Marshall the "Rosary" was worthy of special mention. The entertainment concluded with march "Sousa" and "God Save the King."

A Regretted Farewell
At 10.15 o'clock the Australians paraded and on the east side of the City Hall played with exquisite taste and finish "The Maple Leaf Forever" and "Tipperary," a great crowd applauding. Col. Hemming, in splendid form, expressed appreciation over the visit. Their presence called to mind the magnificent response of Australia to the Empire's call and he hoped slackers of Kingston and shame to see so many able-bodied men walking about. He wished the Cadets all good luck in their future journeying. The Mayor said the last words of farewell. Kingston had enjoyed the visit immensely. The Cadets give the Australian a good bye yell and a starting skyrocket for the Mayor. One could hear the very sound a skyrocket makes. It was a wonderful revelation of the possibilities of the human voice.
