TO ALLOW SHIP TO GO. Ford Peace Voyagers Will Not Be Held Up.

Washington, Nov. 29.—No legal barriers will be raised by the Government against the voyage of Henry Ford's peace ship. State Department officials declared to-day that an ancient federal law suggested in that connection does not apply to Ford's effort.

Many Decline Ford's Invitation. Detroit, Nov. 29.—Henry Ford is not having glorious success in filling his peace ship. Practically all the prominent persons whom he has asked to accompany him to lend mental and moral weight to his expedition have declined, many frankly stating that they are not in sympathy with his ideas.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BILL. By Important Ruling of Ontario Municipal Board.

Toronto, Nov. 29.—An important decision, ruling that as no evidence was produced to show that any portion of the stock of the Ontario & Minnesota Power Company was held by Roman Catholics, no portion of the company's taxes can be apportioned to Port Franks Separate School, has been issued by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

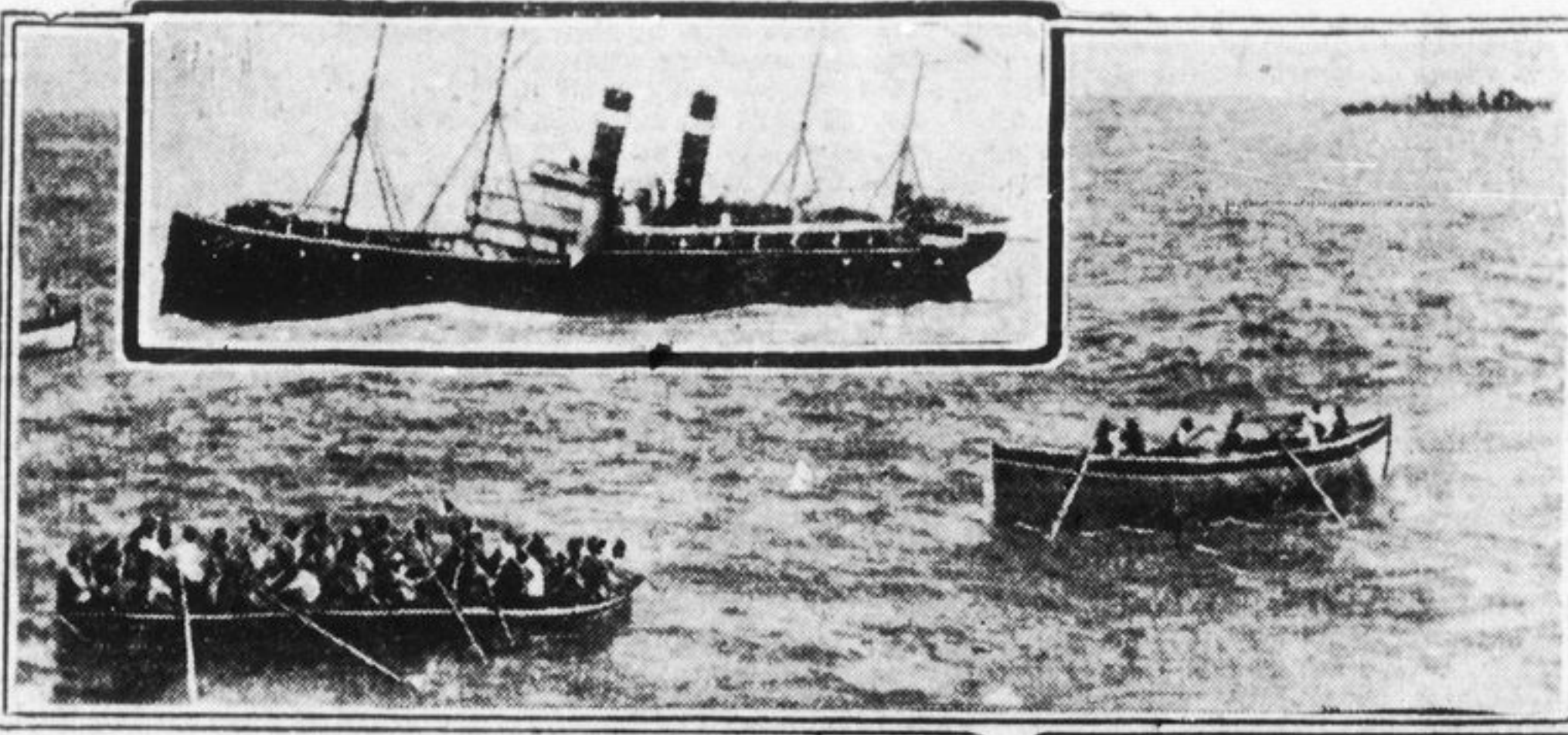
FORCES AT SALONIKA. Over Hundred Thousand French and British Abundantly Supplied.

MAY SWITCH TO ALLIES. Rumblings of Trouble For Teutons in Bulgaria. WHOSE PAPERS URGE THAT BULGARIA HAS ACQUIRED WHAT SHE SOUGHT.

Paris, Nov. 29.—Newspapers of Bulgaria, says the correspondence at Salonika of the Petit Parisien, are declaring that the Bulgarian army, having conquered Serbian Macedonia, Bulgaria should be satisfied with its triumph, and seeing that Thrace is being retained by the Turks, should not further the fears of the Serbians.

KILLED THE WOUNDED DURING THE NIGHT. Bulgars Creep Up And Murder Serbians Left on the Field.

New York, Nov. 29.—A news agency despatch from Monastir, Serbia, Nov. 24th, published here, says: "Murder of wounded Serbian soldiers by Bulgar troops is charged by Gen. Vassich, commander of the southern Serbian army, which was dislodged recently from the Prilep district, and is now concentrated near the Greek frontier to defend Monastir."

ARMY WITHOUT A COUNTRY. London, Nov. 29.—The Serbian forces soon will become an army without a country unless the French should defeat the Bulgarians, four divisions of whom are said to be hammering at the French line.

TROOPS FROM JAMAICA. London, Nov. 29.—The first contingent of men from Jamaica for Kitchener's army reached Plymouth yesterday.

LORD KITCHENER ARRIVES IN PARIS

Disproving Rumor That He Was Eliminated From British Cabinet--Thought He Has Mapped Out Balkan Campaign To Be Followed.

(Special to the Whig.) Paris, Nov. 29.—Lord Kitchener arrived here at 8.39 a.m. to-day. General Buller, of the British army, and Captain Gigodot, representing French War Minister Gallieni, met him at the station.

When he visited Italy it was thought he might merely be arranging for Italian aid in the Balkans, and that he would return there to direct the Allies' campaign.

GREECE'S REPLY TO ALLIES. Athens, Nov. 29.—The Greek reply to the Entente Powers' last note, setting forth demands in connection with the Balkan campaign, was handed to the Allies' Minister here on Sunday.

Allies' Gains Against Huns In Kamaruns. London, Nov. 29.—Rapid progress by the British and French in their campaign against the Germans in the Kamaruns, in equatorial West Africa, was officially reported to-day.

FOR COMPULSORY SERVICE. By-election Results in Defeat of Labor Candidate.

London, Nov. 29.—In the election in the Merthyr-Tydvil constituency to choose a successor to the late James Keir Hardie, leader of the Independent Labor party, Stanton, the unofficial Labor candidate for Winstone, the official Labor candidate.

Three Steamships Sunk. London, Nov. 29.—The French steamships Algerian and Omar and the British steamship Tanja have been sunk by submarines, presumably in the Mediterranean.

Agent Only For the British Government. Montreal, Nov. 29.—The Dominion Government, in commandeering part of the supply of grain in the eastern elevators in Canada, is acting as the agent of the British Government.

Canada's Hard Wheat. Ottawa, Nov. 29.—Owing to its hard qualities, the wheat from the Canadian west particularly is well suited for keeping in hot climates.

SEND GENERALS TO RESERVE. Commands For Men Of Proved Vigor and Initiative.

Paris, Nov. 29.—The constant efforts of General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, to keep the higher commands in the charge of men of proved vigor and initiative are exemplified once more by an announcement in the Official Journal that seven division generals and three brigade generals have been transferred to the reserve.
