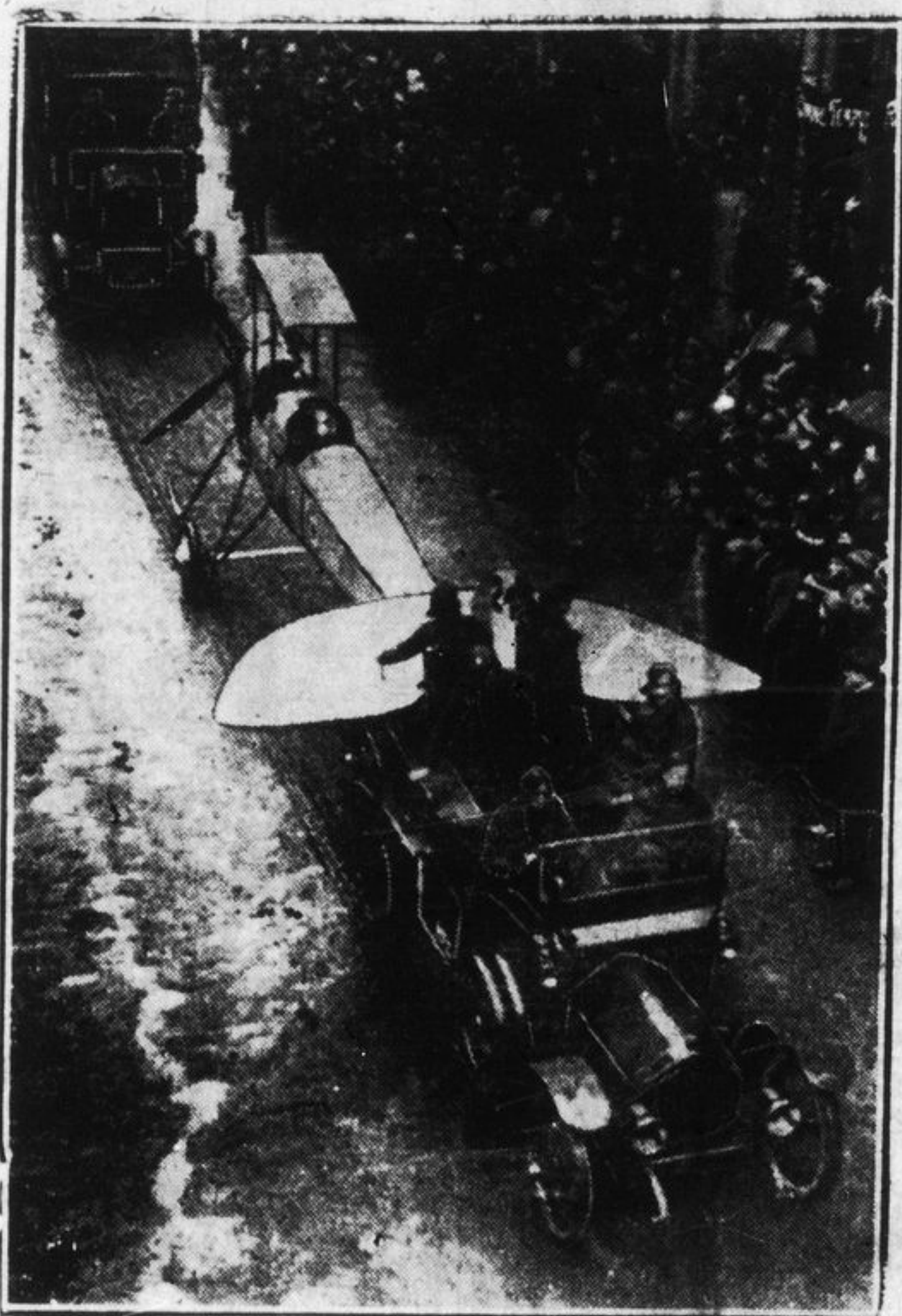


VIENNA EXPECTS BIG DEFEAT BY ITALY

ITALY IS DEFEATING THE AUSTRIAN ARMY

In Fiercest Battle of Whole War King Victor's Troops Triumph--Vienna Believed To Be Preparing Public For News of Reverse.

(Special to the Whig) London, Dec. 1.—With the retreat of the greater part of the Serbian army across the Albanian frontier, the slowness of the operations against Montenegro and in Southern Serbia owing to the wintry weather, and the absence of any major operations on the western and eastern fronts, interest in the military side of the war is now transferred to the Austro-Italian frontier, where King Victor Emmanuel's troops are carrying on an energetic offensive.

AUSTRIA LOOKING TO ITALY FOR PEACE

London, Dec. 1.—The Pall Mall Gazette, associating Emperor William's visit to Vienna with reports that Germany is willing to enter upon peace negotiations, ventures the opinion that, as already suggested, the Emperor's trip may present a fresh attempt to bring about conclusion of a separate peace, between Austria and Italy.

LAST SERBIAN TOWN TAKEN

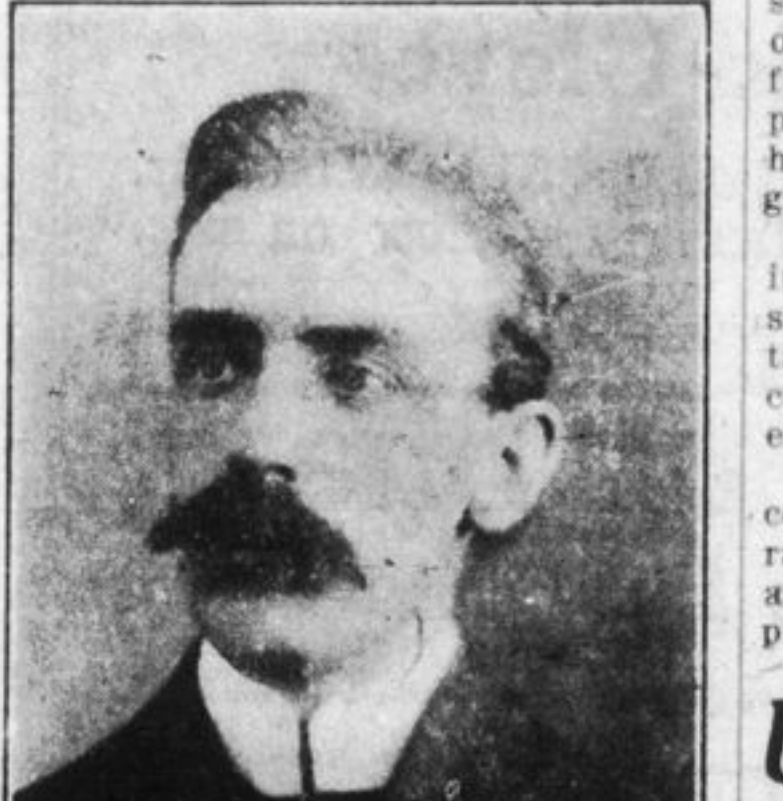

Lieut. Col. W. T. Connell, professor of pathology and bacteriology at Queen's University, who has been supervising the medical work of Queen's Stationary Hospital at Cairo, Egypt, arrived in Kingston on Wednesday morning to again take over his duties at the University.
