NEWS ABOUT THE TROOPS QUARTERED IN THE CITY

(Continued From Page 5.) At ten o'clock on Thursday morning "A" Company, 59th Battalion, will leave the city and take up quarters in the Armouries at Gananoque. At the same time "D" Company will leave for Cornwall and go into winter quarters in Ross' Mill at that place. Both towns are arranging a royal welcome for the soldiers. Lieut.-Col. H. J. Dawson was in Cornwall on Sunday and the ladies there have furnished a large building as a Khaki Club complete with games, card-tables, piano, billiards and kitchen.

"B" and "C" Companies will leave at 10 o'clock on Saturday for Brockville and go into winter quarters.

Lieut.-Col. H. J. Dawson announced on Wednesday that the recruiting office of the battalion at the corner of Wellington and Clarence streets will be kept open indefinitely. Owing to such good work being done by Lieut. A. P. Christmas it was thought advisable to continue the work even after the battalion leaves the city, as the recruiting ideas were being spread to other units as well as the 59th.

Lieut.-Col. C. A. Lowe, O.C. 146th Battalion, and Capt. Carl Kane, who is acting adjutant, are very busy with details of organization. Recruits are now being accepted at their office in Room 14 at the Armouries.

Lieut.-Col. J. A. McCammon, Brockville, has been appointed officer commanding the 146th Leeds and Grenville Overseas Battalion. Col. McCammon is the son of the late counties and his home is in Gananoque.

The Provisional School of Infantry opened on Wednesday morning with about fifty officers in attendance. It is expected that in a few days over eighty will be in attendance if the authorities see fit to accept all applications. The officers and N.C.O.'s are quartered over Toye's bakery on Ontario street and over Gibson's Drug Store on King street.

Capt. J. M. Wilson, returned home on Tuesday night.

Major H. R. Wilson, D.A.A. and Q.M., left on Wednesday on militia business with the St. Lawrence canal guard.

Lieut. Pilley, formerly of the Divisional pay office, but later the assistant adjutant of the 80th Battalion, has been promoted to the rank of Captain and is now paymaster of Lt.-Col. Ketcheson's regiment. Capt. Pilley's experience for so many years in the Divisional pay office will fit him well for his new place in the 80th. He has moved his family from Kingston to Belleville.

A Kingston soldier returned from the front, stated that the bodies of dead German women were found in trenches captured by British. He saw some of them himself.

Recruiting organization for the 146th Battalion, of which Lieut.-Col. C. A. Lowe is officer commanding, is well under way. The campaign is going to start on Saturday. A tent will be erected on Princess street opposite the Randolph Hotel, and the officers are confident with the organization that is to be used that the 1,000 men will be recruited in ninety days.

It is the determination of the officers that the 146th will be made up only of men of the highest standard, and for this reason great care will be taken in the selection of recruits. The 146th, when it becomes a unit at full strength, is to be second to none in the Canadian expeditionary force.

It has been decided that every man who is accepted for the battalion will wear a badge with "146th Overseas Battalion" on his left arm to indicate to the public that he is in training for overseas service. Uniform will be issued as soon as possible after the men are accepted.

BUILDING IN KINGSTON.

The City Engineer reports that for November the value of building permits issued at his office amounted to \$19,270. During the eleven months of the year ending November 30th, the total value of Kingston building permits was \$203,460, as compared with \$281,457 for the same period of 1914. So far this year sixty new residences have been erected in Kingston.

HOME NURSING COURSE

Dr. James Third Gave Fine Lecture At Y.W.C.A. Parlors.

Dr. James Third's lecture to the members of the Y.W.C.A. on Tuesday evening was well attended. It was the first of a course of lectures to be given by local doctors. The subject of the lecture was "The Wear and Tear of the Nerve".

By numerous illustrations, the lecturer showed how work and therefore responsibility, had been shifted during the last quarter of a century, from muscle to nerve. The proof of the great increase in the number of functional nervous diseases could be found in the number of Sanitari and Rest Homes for nervous diseases that had sprung up in Canada in recent years. The lecturer then dealt with some of the types of neurasthenia or nervous prostration, in an interesting manner, showing how the condition developed and how it would be avoided.

At the close of the lecture, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Dr. Third, on motion of Mrs. James Leslie, a member of the Educational Committee of the Y.W.C.A.
