NEWS ABOUT THE TROOPS QUARTERED IN THE CITY

Due to the strict following out of the rules laid down by Lieut.-Col. E. C. Arnold for emptying the Drydock Barracks there is little if any danger about the fire outbreak in the building. Col. Arnold had large placards placed all over the building and these contain concise and definite orders as to what is to be done should fire break out. "The bugler must sound the alarm and the men must form up and walk out in a quiet orderly manner." The men then form up west of the gate on Ontario street and allow every freedom for the movement of the city fire brigade. Any help asked for by the fire chief must be given immediately.

Each of three batteries this week had fire drill and the results were highly satisfactory for a first drill. Subsequent practices will be made in a shorter time. The 33rd Battery, which is on the top floor, was emptied in two minutes, and thirty seconds, or thirty seconds faster than the Drydock Barracks which is on the second floor, or the 32nd Battery which is on the first floor.

Col. Arnold expects to have a fire drill at night next week, in which the time to empty the building will be taken. No one will know when the alarm is to be sounded except Col. Arnold so that an accurate record of the time may be made.

A. R. Tuite, J. Marshall, J. H. Conner, W. J. Forsythe, F. Funnell, J. Rea, W. R. Curson and M. A. Sanderson of the artillery batteries at the Drydock Barracks were successful in passing the examinations of the School of Signalling held at Barrieffield camp.

Lieut. B. S. Ami, D. B. S. O., is in charge of the signalling class for the artillery and is meeting with splendid results. A complete telegraphic set was in use on Thursday morning and Lieut. Ami is hopeful of soon obtaining a complete set of the instruments now in use of the front. Lectures are given every day in the recreation room on the main floor of the barracks.

Lieut. F. H. Booth, of the Booth Lumber company, Ottawa, reported for duty with the 32nd Battery on Friday morning.

Proving that the 32nd Battery is a good one there are constantly coming in to Major S. A. McKenna applicants from officers who desire to serve him. Four applications were received on Thursday morning. Beside the staff now on duty there are a number qualifying at the Royal School of Artillery.

F. McDonald of the city has enlisted for overseas service in the 32nd Battery.

Lieut. R. Young, Ottawa is expected to report to the 32nd Battery to-day.

Fifty men, picked from 400 who wanted to join the 32nd Battery, will arrive on Saturday from Ottawa.

There are now thirty-five men attending the School of Artillery Signalling under Lieut. Ami, Ten others are away on leave.

Capt. D. E. Bell, D. B. M. O., is examining and vaccinating recruits.

There is a very muddy crossing at the Ontario street entrance to the Drydock Barracks and the authorities should have a load or two of cinders put there.

William Kinch and W. M. Johnston, city, have enlisted in the 33rd Battery.

The new adjutant of the 80th Battalion, Lieut. R. W. Nichols, is well known in the city having at Barrieffield Camp proved himself a splendid officer.

It is published for the information of all concerned that officers always salute with the right hand.

Lieut. McRae, of the School of Mechanical Transport, was in this city on Friday morning and reported to Major Hamilton, A.D. of S. and T. The 3rd Division has responded splendidly to the call for mechanical transport drivers for the Imperial Army and Lieut. McRae accepted thirty-three in Ottawa on Thursday. He left on Friday for Etobicoke and will later return to Coburg where the drivers will be mobilized until ready to go overseas.

Staff-sergeant Graham, Army Service Corps who has been on sick leave has returned to duty.

Lieut. G. O. H. Driver, Army Service Corps, winter services at Belleville, has been promoted to the rank of captain.

Lieuts. R. W. Leslie and H. W. Lawson, of the Royal Military College, have reported for duty with the R.C.H.A., and posted to "C" Battery.

Three recruits for "C" Battery were accepted on Friday morning.

Lieut. G. R. Long, Ottawa, formerly with the 90th Regiment of Winnipeg detachment at the front, is attending the Provisional School of Infantry here. He was wounded at the front but has since recovered.

Peterborough has three more representatives in the 32nd Battery at Kingston. Messrs. Walter, Ernest and Percy Hamblin, three brothers who have been working in Toronto. Peterborough has sent 135 men, practically a whole battery.

The strength of "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., on Friday morning was 100 men at the Artillery Park Barracks waiting to go overseas this month and 100 that were transferred on Thursday to go overseas as the January draft. Lieut. W. C. Thackeray and Lieut. J. C. Price are the officers of the December draft.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

The steamers Key Bell and Key West have been laid up near the G. T. R. sheds for the winter. All of the boats of the Keystone line, six in number, will be laid up here.

The steamers Stanstead and Rhodes passed here Thursday on their way to Trenton to be laid up.

The tug Florence and two barges, of the Hackett Company, have been laid up at Portsmouth.

The steamers Wahoonah and Mapleton passed on their way to Port William.

The steamer Waffle was at Swift's wharf to-day, from South Bay, loaded with canned goods, on the way to Montreal.

The tug Bartlett is due to arrive to-day from Oswego, with the barge Quebec, coal-laden; the tug Emerson is due to arrive from Montreal with two light barges.

There are a few more coal barges to go through the Lachine canal before navigation completely closes. Among them are the Rickerton, Dundale and Brookdale from Kingston.

It is likely that they will be taken down by the Sincennes McNaughton tugs which arrived at Kingston from Port Dalhousie, where they had conveyed a dredge from Montreal. The tugs left over two weeks ago, but owing to unfavorable weather on Lake Ontario were unable to make fast time.

The Kinmount, of the Montreal Transportation Company, went into dry dock of the Montreal Dry Dock Company, Mill street, Montreal, Wednesday morning for overhauling.

Prices For Cheese.

So far this season, the average selling price of cheese on the Frontenac Board has been 15 1/2 cents per pound. It went as high as 18 1/2 cents, and as low as 12 cents and a fraction. During the season of 1914, the average price was a little over 14 cents. There has been a keen demand for cheese during the season of 1915. Next week's meeting of the Board will probably be the last of the season.
