

WILSON'S DENUNCIATION OF HYPHENATED-AMERICANS

President is Bitter in Address Before United States Congress--Urged Measures to Save the Honor and Self-Respect of the Nation.

(Special to the Whig.) Washington, Dec. 7.—In words that fairly snapped with their vigor and burned in their vitriolic strength, President Wilson hurled at Congress to-day a denunciation of hyphenated Americanism.

It was the electric shock of his annual message to Congress. The bitter words with which he embellished his demand that Congress take cognizance of "corruptions of the mind and heart," against those "who had poured the poison of disloyalty into the very arteries of our national life," rang out staccato-like in the vast hall of the House of Representatives.

MAN OF 94 WEES

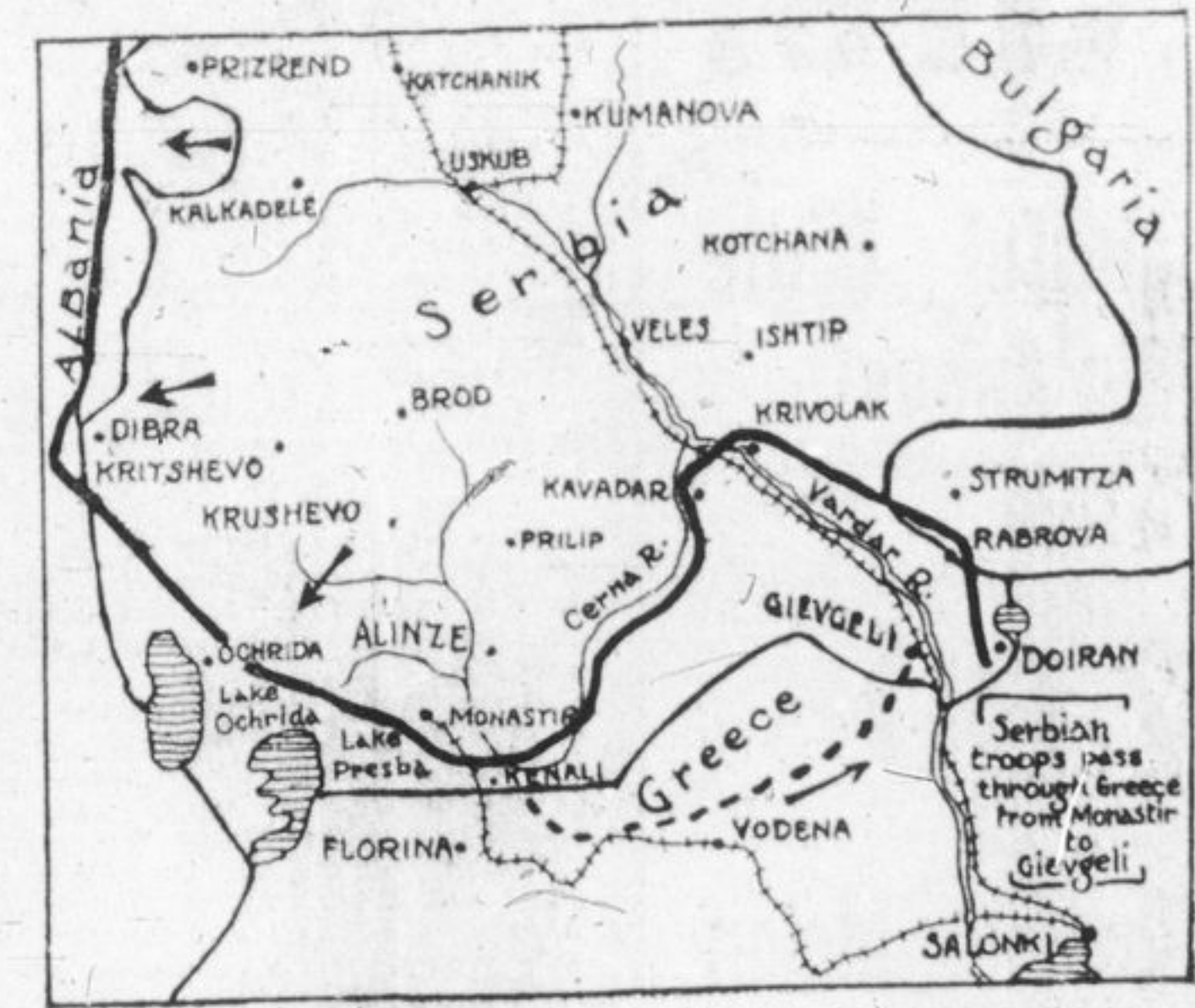
