TO MAKE AN APPEAL

FOR CHRISTMAS DONATIONS TO GENERAL HOSPITAL.

November Very Busy In the Institution — Management Committee Aims at The Highest Efficiency.

The Board of Governors of Kingston General Hospital met on Monday afternoon. The Committee of Management report for November detailing a number of things that had been done for the hospital and outlining a number of things to be undertaken during the present month. It was announced that a general Christmas appeal would be made to the public as usual similar to that of last year which was no nobly responded to by the people of Kingston and the vicinity.

The visiting governors for the month, N. C. Polson, Jr. and William Anderson brought in an unusually comprehensive and suggestive report of their recent inspection of the Hospital. Not a corner of the building escaped their notice, and a great deal of business common sense was put into their suggestions. A special vote of thanks was given them for the carefully prepared report and the Committee of Management was specially requested to report as to what could be done about the improvements suggested.

It is the aim of the Committee of Management, and in fact of the whole Board of Governors, not only to reach the highest state of efficiency in the Kingston General Hospital, but under all circumstances to maintain this efficiency, and the present Committee of Management is quite alive to its duties and the public will find everything about the Institution kept in the highest possible state of cleanliness and efficiency.

The financial statement was considered satisfactory. The report of Dr. Coglan, the newly appointed superintendent, showed that November had been a very busy month; in fact it exceeded any month previously reported. Notwithstanding the large number of patients treated, the death rate was very small.

The medical staff are to be invited to meet the management regularly so that it may have the benefit of their suggestions and large experience. The members present were: A. F. Chown, (Chairman), Prof. D. H. Marshall, R. E. Kent, William Anderson, T. F. Harrison, N. C. Polson, Rev. D. Laing, F. G. Lockett, and G. Y. Chown.

T. F. Harrison and James Crawford were appointed visiting governors for the present month.

The second of these lectures will be given to-night by Dr. E. C. D. MacCallum. Subject: "Contagion and Disinfection."

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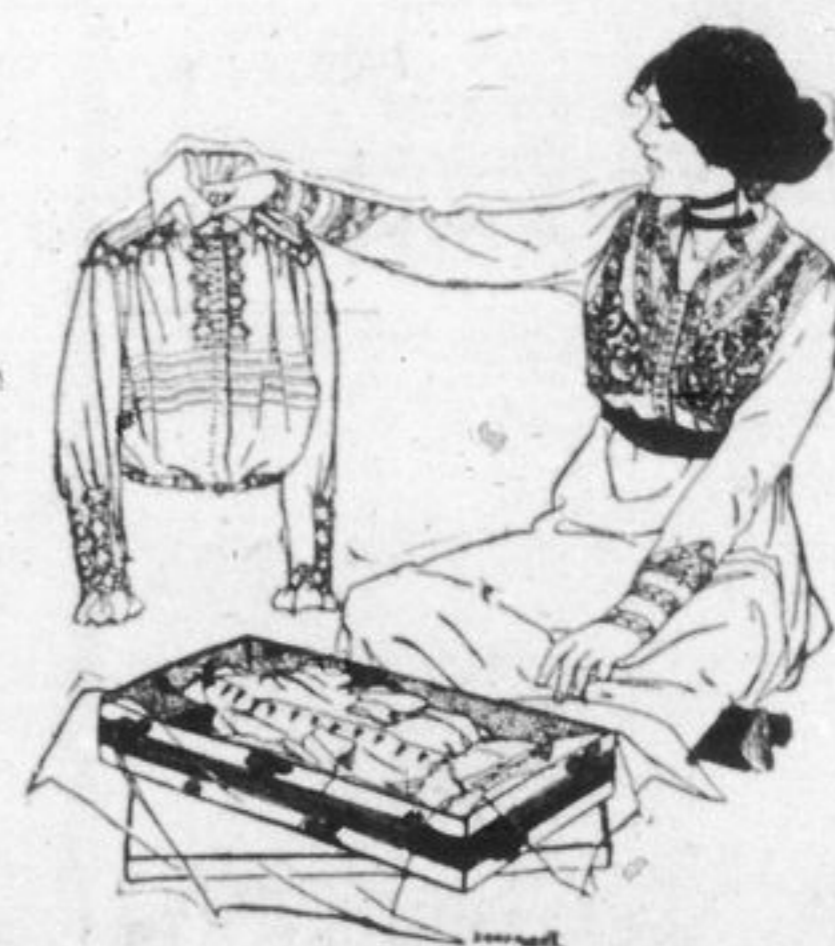
