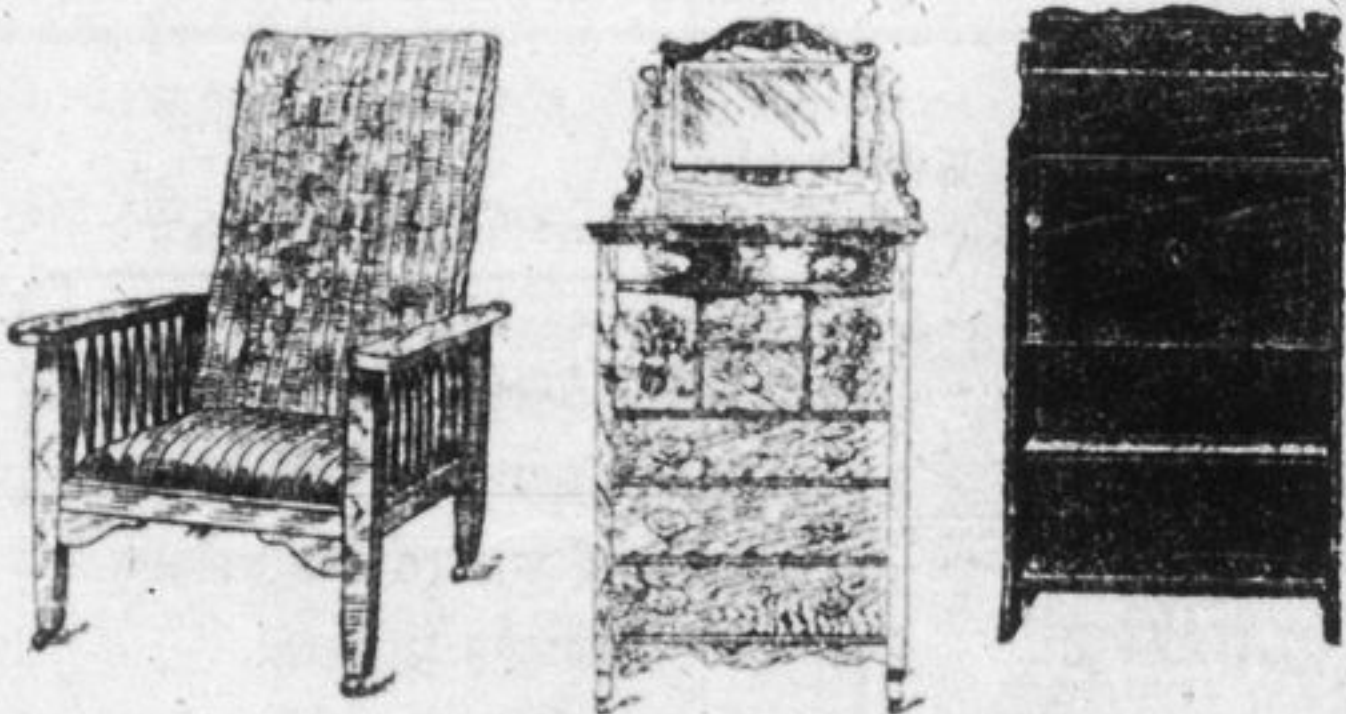

STEAMSHIP MEN ENLIST.

Canadian Line Officers To Go To The Front.

Montreal, Dec. 10.—That the Canada Steamship Line staff is to enlist for overseas service is the undoubted

story here. The eligible men are to be enlisted, in one battalion, and officers, who are to go to Halifax at once to qualify for commissions, will lead the company. There are forty-six C. S. L. men in the trenches now.

NEWS ABOUT THE TROOPS QUARTERED IN THE CITY

Reports from different parts of the division state that since the more strenuous recruiting campaign has been in force there has been an increase in the number of recruits for overseas service. The system now in use makes every man wearing the uniform work as a recruiting officer, so that his unit may be brought up to strength, because unless this plan is carried out the competition between units will make the slack ones short of men. Each battalion has orders to confine its efforts to the county to which it is allotted but it is an open secret that there is constant "stealing" of recruits from other counties. This is not being fought very strenuously as it works out to the common good. In fact the 3rd Division is supplying men to both Toronto and Montreal for overseas service.

In hundreds of cases, young men with a few dollars to spend have gone to either Toronto or Montreal, had their "time" and enlisted there rather than get into uniform and spend the winter training in their little home town. This has meant a great leakage from the 3rd Division, as there are no large cities within its limits, and for that reason all of the new battalions have an equal chance for recruits. It is likely that more battalions will be formed.

At present there are the following battalions authorized in this division: 59th at Brockville; 77th at Ottawa; 80th at Belleville; 92nd at Peterboro; 19th Lindsay; 130th Lanark; 136th Port Hope; 139th Cobourg; 146th Kingston; 154th Cornwall; 155th Brockville; 156th Picton. It is interesting to note that Kingston by statistics has more than justified her name as a military centre. With the exception of two militia regiments, a battalion for overseas service represents everyone, but in Kingston's case the 14th and 47th Regiments have three battalions, the 21st, 59th and 146th Battalions to their credit.

Lieut. Wilmer Scandrett, brother of Capt. H. Scandrett, R. C. H. A., London, has received orders to report in England to the Royal Flying Corps.

Recruits are coming in daily for the 146th Battalion, which is being organized here under Lieut.-Col. Charles A. Low. The recruiting tent on Princess street, under Lieut. N. Munroe, is a busy place, with enquiries being made by Kingston men who are intending to enlist. Sergt. W. McFriedridge's automobile, bearing the sign, "146th Batt." is busy advertising the need for recruits.

The officers of the battalion are confident that hundreds of Kingstonians will answer the call to arms by enlisting in the 146th and that in a very short time companies will be organized and the people of Kingston will soon see a battalion on its streets which will equal the 21st or 59th Battalion.

EXTRACTS FROM A LETTER

Written From the Front By Col. A. E. Ross.

The following are extracts from a letter from Col. A. E. Ross: We have some great experiences. Dr. Graham has been of great service, and has clearly demonstrated that methods for examination of insane are sound.

I left Kingston with Stone, Graham and McConnell and ten other men. They are practically all here, and doing good work, and I hope to keep most of them.

There are only four officers out of eleven in the unit who have served continuously with it. I have seen McKinnon and McLaughlin, and heard of others of the dressers who hold commissions, all doing well.

This is very responsible work and takes more time than the Ambulance. Spent yesterday with the General in the inspection of baths. One day a week is spent on an inspection of trenches. My sanitary inspector is Major J. A. Amyot, of Toronto, so you can see we have experience and knowledge in the one man. He accompanies me in the trenches and we are getting good results. Every fellow can go so long, but the expected must happen some day. I do not know anything you can do, of which we are in need.

The Faculty has acted generously in the allowance they made to me, and I think it will serve for medical equipment, not authorized for Field Ambulance, but which will enable us to do a lot of good work, such as eye and ear instruments. If we are not moving, we can do some laboratory work at night, and the experience. These are articles not authorized for use in Field Ambulance. I'll try and get more Queen's men up.

Capt. McLelland is here with the Engineers. Lomer, former health officer of Ottawa, is here in an advanced dressing station, and is just what we want, as he is up for good.

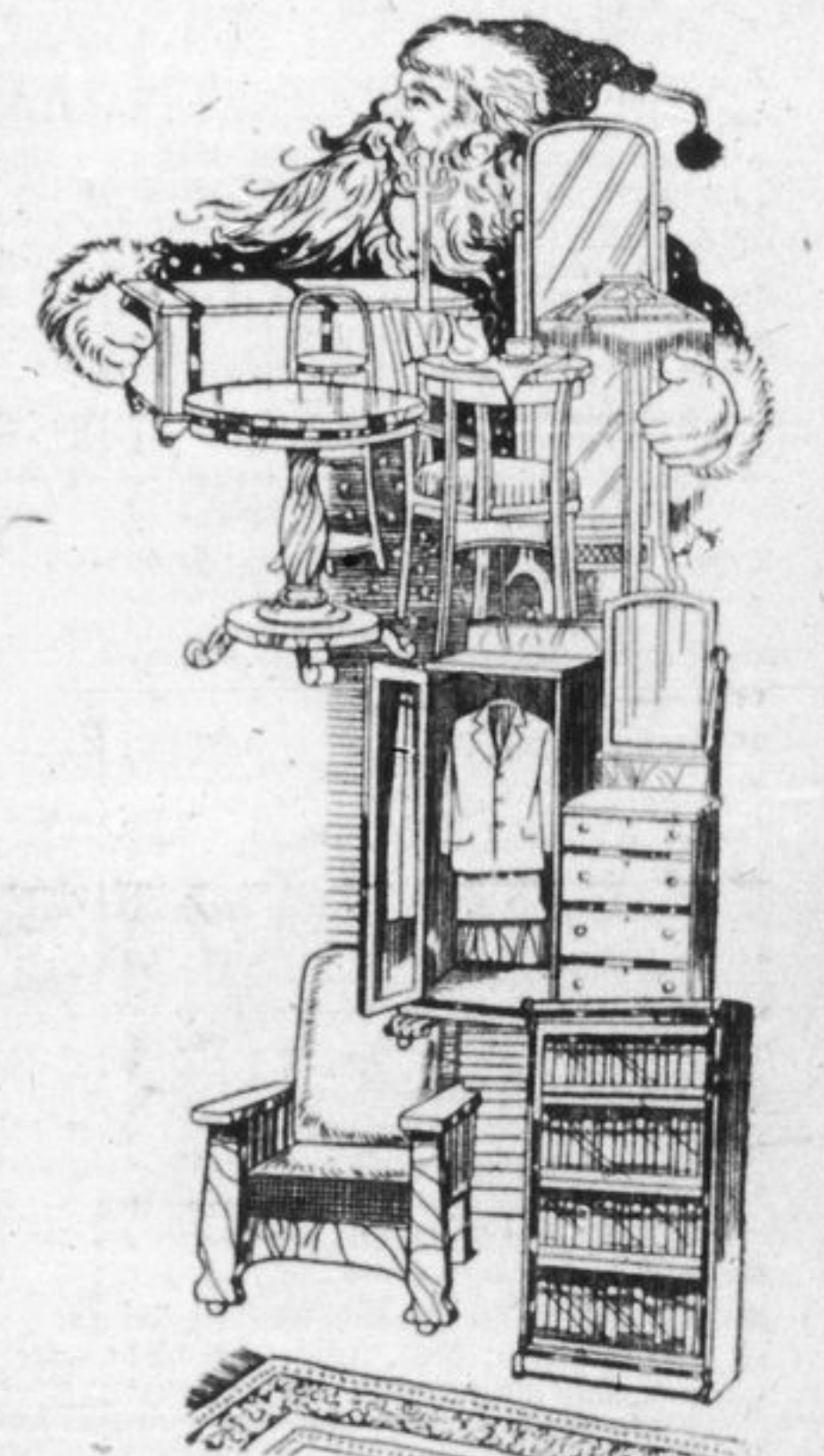

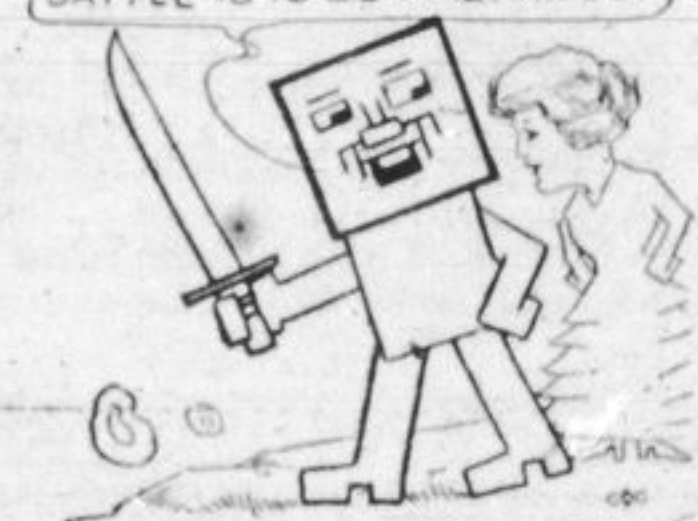
