

Reports from different parts of the division state that since the more strenuous recruiting campaign has been in force there has been an increase in the number of recruits for overseas service. The system now in use makes every man wearing the uniform work as a recruiting officer, so that his unit may be brought up to strength, because unless this plan is carried out the competition between units will make the slack ones short of men. Each battalion has orders to confine its efforts to the county to which it are alloted but it is an open This is not being fought very strenuously-as it works out to the common good. In fact the 3rd Division is supplying men to both Toronto and Montreal for overseas ser-

In hundreds of cases, young men with a few dollars to spend have gone to either Toronto or Montreal, had their "time" and enlisted there rather than get into uniform and spend the winter training in their for recruits. It is likely that more battalions will be formed.

At present there are the following battalions authorized in this divi sion: 59th at Brockville; 77th at Ot tawa; 80th Belleville; 93rd Peterboro; 109th Lindsay; 130th Lanark 136th Port Hope; 139th Cobourg 146th Kingston; 154th Cornwall; 155th Brockville; 156th Picton. It is interesting to note that Kingston by statistics has more than justified her name as a military centre. With the exception of two militia regi ments, a battalion for overseas service represents everyone, but in Kingston's case the 14th and 47th Regiments have three battalions, the 21st, 59th and 146th Battalions to their credit.


