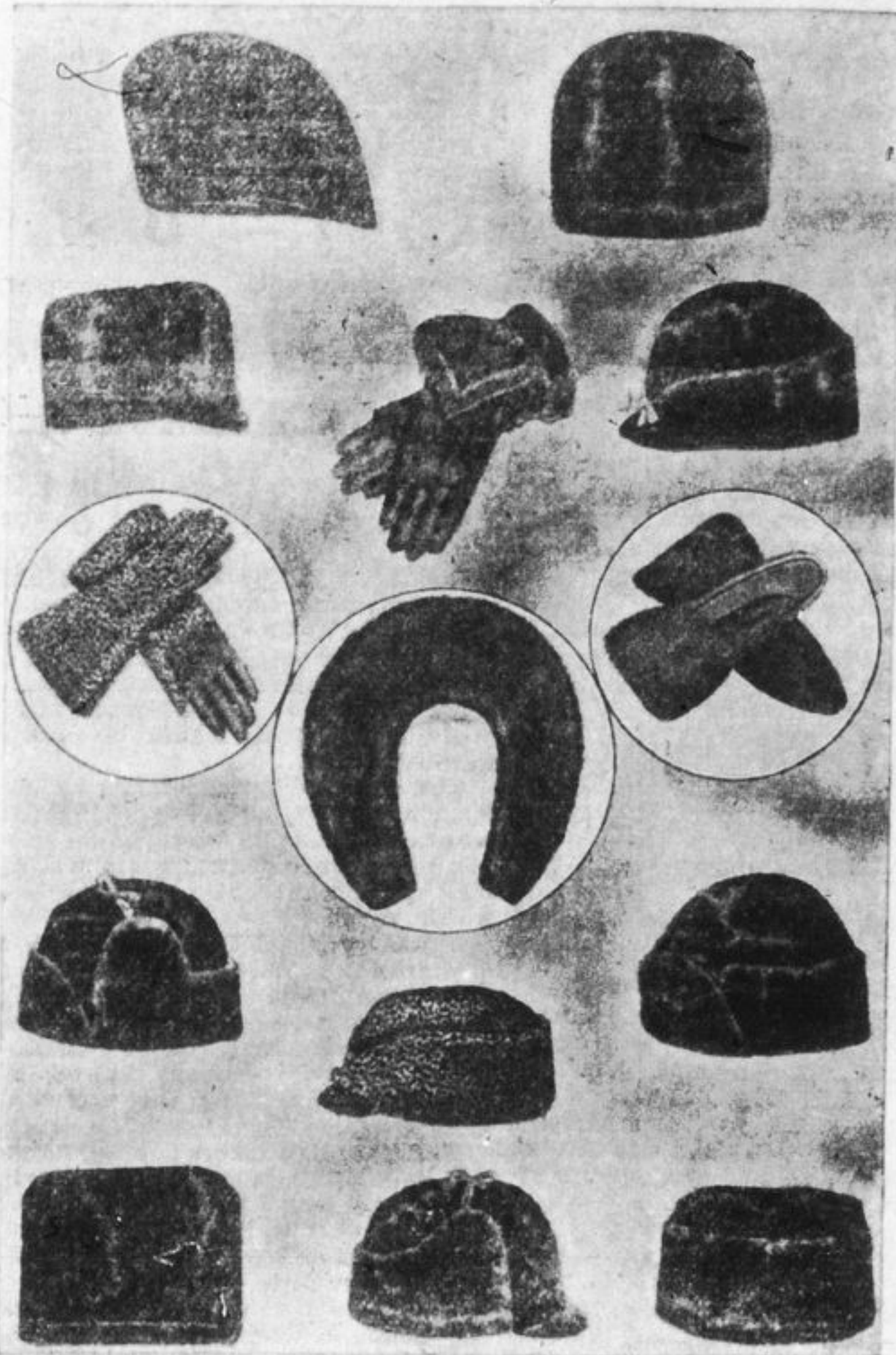

IN MARINE CIRCLES

TWO GRAIN CARRIERS ARRIVED FROM FORT WILLIAM.

Steamers Keynor and Keyfive will be the last arrivals of the season—Discharging at Richardson's Elevator—Had a Good Trip Down.

The steamers Keynor and Keyfive arrived in port on Sunday night from Fort William, both grain-laden, for Richardson's elevator, and they will be the last arrivals in port this season. As soon as the vessels have discharged their cargo they will be laid up in this city.

Capt. John Mullin is in command of the steamer Keynor and Capt. Bunting is in charge of the steamer Keyfive. They report having had a very good trip down for this time of the year. The vessels left Kingston for Fort William together, and were close together all the way up and down.

The steamer Waffle arrived from Montreal Saturday afternoon and loaded grain at Richardson's elevator.

G. C. Sherman, Watertown, N.Y., is having a new boat built at Clayton N.Y. It is to be of mahogany, forty feet long and seven feet beam. The boat will make about thirty miles an hour.

For the harbor at Cape Vincent N.Y., there is recommended the expenditure of \$20,000 for replacing with concrete a pier of timber superstructure now badly decayed. This will practically complete the Cape Vincent project, as eighty-nine per cent of the project was completed at the end of the fiscal year 1915.

HUNS CHARGE WILSON

With Seeking to Create a New Maritime Law.

Berlin, Dec. 12 (via London).—Commenting upon the United States note to Austria concerning the Sinking of the Ancona, the Morgen Post says: "If this report is correct, President Wilson is endeavoring to create utterly new maritime law, for, according to the existing law upon which American, indeed, based its attitude, it was permissible to fire at a ship which disregarded a demand to stop and attempted to flee, irrespective of whether or not passengers were aboard. In such a case the captain of the firing ship assumes the responsibility for the welfare of his passengers."

ONE CRIMINAL CASE

AT COURT OF GENERAL SESSIONS ON TUESDAY.

Three Civil Cases To Be Tried—Judge Lavell Will Speak in the Interests of Recruiting.

There is only one criminal case called for the General Sessions of the Peace, which opens before Judge Lavell on Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock. This case is a charge against George Smith, Westbrook, for carnally knowing a girl under fourteen years of age. As D. A. Givens, who was representing the accused, does not know of his whereabouts he will likely be a minus quantity when Court is called. Smith is on bail.

There are three civil cases for the County Court Sessions which are held at the same time. They are: (Jury List)—John Stewart vs. the Bay of Quinte Railway Company et al for \$275 for the loss of a horse killed by defendant's railway train.

(Non-Jury List)—Dominion Sugar Co., Ltd. vs. J. Bellie for \$229.21, price of goods sold and delivered.

W. D. Wilson vs. Archibald Macpherson for \$400 damages trespassing on Lot 38, 2nd Concession, and Lot 37, 3rd Concession, of township of Miller, and cutting timber and damaging the said lots and a mill thereon, and for possession of said lots, and an injunction restraining the defendant from trespassing thereon.

As there are county court sessions being held elsewhere, which will make it inconvenient for some of the counsel to be present, there may be an adjournment for a few days of some of the cases.

Judge Lavell will likely speak a few words in the interests of recruiting at the court, as it is a splendid opportunity of impressing residents from the county of the need of men for overseas service.
