SCHEDULES ARRANGED

FOR THE INTERMEDIATE AND JUNIOR O. H. A. GAMES.

Belleville and Queen's Will Not Have Teams in Junior Series, But Have Entered Teams in Intermediate Series—The Dates Selected.

At a meeting held in the Randolph Hotel on Wednesday night a schedule for the eastern section in the O. H. A. junior series was drawn up. There was a report that Queen's University and Belleville would enter a team in this series, but both have entered a team in the Intermediate series, which was drawn up at a meeting held in Belleville on Wednesday afternoon. Queen's has plenty of material for a junior team, but decided that two teams, a senior and intermediate, would be about all the college could look after this winter.

Intermediate Series. The intermediate series for the eastern section in the O. H. A. was drawn up at a meeting held on Wednesday afternoon in the Anglo-American Hotel at Belleville. Owing to the fact that the opening of covered rink in Kingston took place on Wednesday night, John Dawson was unable to attend this meeting, and he was represented by Rev. A. J. Wilson, Napanee, ex-chairman of Queen's Athletic Committee. B. Shorey, convenor of the committee, was also present. The schedule drawn up is as follows:

To Line Up With Queen's Parker, who played hockey with Varsity two years ago, will likely be on Queen's senior team this winter. Cook, who played with the junior Frontenacs, may also be seen this season with Queen's.

Practice Friday Night. The Frontenacs will have a practice at the covered rink from 8 till 9 o'clock on Friday night, when all hockey players are asked to turn out. A special invitation is extended to any player in khaki. Any junior player in the city will be gladly welcomed.

Basketball Game. Owing to Queen's students requiring the gymnasium, the basketball games between Y.M.C.A. and 33rd Battery, and Queen's and 34th second team, were transferred to the Y.M.C.A. gymnasium on Wednesday evening. When the time came for playing only part of the 33rd team were present and the game was forfeited to the Y.M.C.A.

Queen's did not show up for its game which game counted one for the 34th team.

Next week Y.M.C.A. team was to play the 34th Battery but owing to the Queen's and 33rd Battery team not showing up, the Y.M.C.A. and 34th Battery brought on their game. The teams lined up as follows: Y.M.C.A. forward Price, Joyner, Revere, Simmons, centre Barber, Holland, defence Cooke, Godwin, defence Lyngge. The referee was Mr. McCullough. The Y.M.C.A. team won by 42 to 34. Simmons was the strong man for the Y.M.C.A. while Revere did good work for the 34th, each scoring twenty points.

The Non-Jury Cases To Come Before Judge Lavell On Monday. All the non-jury cases, which were entered at the General Sessions of the Peace, have been adjourned for hearing on Monday morning next before Judge Lavell. DIOCESE OF ONTARIO.

A Special Day of Intercession Appointed.

The Bishop of Kingston has issued the following: My Dear Brethren,—The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have issued a notice appointing Sunday, Jan. 2nd, 1916, as a special day of intercession in connection with the war. They recommend also that wherever possible the observance should begin on the two preceding days; that Friday, Dec. 31st, the closing day of the year, should be kept as a day of self-denial and of penitence for the manifold sins and shortcomings whereof we are conscious as a people, and that on Saturday (New Year's Day), services should be held and opportunities be given for quiet preparation for the Holy Communion and other services of the Sunday thus appointed. This proposal has the approval and endorsement of His Majesty the King. I therefore order and appoint hereby that in all parishes and churches throughout the Diocese of Ontario, Sunday, Jan. 2nd, 1916, shall be observed as a day of special intercession in connection with the war, and that Friday, Dec. 31st, and Saturday, Jan. 1st, shall also, wherever possible, be observed as directed above, and that due and proper notice thereof shall be given in all churches not later than the previous Sunday, Dec. 26th, by the public reading of this letter. I suggest that special offerings should be made on those days for the Canadian Red Cross Society. Your Friend and Bishop, EDWARD J. KINGSTON.
