THE PRESENCE OF GOD

REALIZED MORE DURING THESE DAYS OF STRIFE.

In Times of Peace Men Are Inclined To Forget God—Rev. Principal Mackay, at Convocation Hall.

The best of our sons are offering their lives to avenge these awful atrocities, and to declare to the world that God is in the world," said Rev. Principal Mackay of Westminster Hall, Vancouver, B. C., preaching in Convocation Hall, on Sunday afternoon.

"Justice, truth and liberty must triumph if God is to be master in His universe. This is a holy war. The men in the trenches have found that God is real. I believe that men have realized the presence of God more during this terrible struggle than during the days of peace and sunshine. In times of peace men become so interested in their own affairs that they forget God. He was not to be all their work. To you as individuals there must come this personal vision. And when we do find Him, our life will be richer and nobler."

The speaker took as his text the story of Jacob and how God was brought near him. The text was taken from Genesis, xxviii, 16: "And Jacob awoke out of his sleep, and he said surely the Lord is in this place and I knew it not."
