NEWS ABOUT TROOPS QUARTERED IN CITY

The appointment of Lieut.-Col. L. A. G. Roy as commandant of the Royal School of Artillery will relieve a great amount of work. Col. G. Hunter-Ogilvie, who has been holding down the dual position of Assistant Adjutant General and that of Commandant of the R. S. A., and R. G. H. A. In the first period after the war the first thought of the Militia Department was to send as many men overseas as possible and allow the work at home to take a second place. All over the country the rush has gradually become so great a strain on certain officers that it has been absolutely impossible for them to continue with all of their work. This has been the case with Col. Ogilvie, and though he has been busy night and day the work has increased to such an extent that more time had to be devoted to his headquarters work.

Col. Roy has been in militia work since 1895 and has worked up through the ranks until a short time ago he was promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel in the Royal Canadian Artillery at Quebec. Last week Col. Roy was in the city and made an inspection of the local units. Officers in all of the units at the time were unanimous in considering him one of the best of officers and one who was thoroughly acquainted with his work. His appointment has been of genuine pleasure as he is well fitted for the work. The appointment was announced in Monday's Whig.

The three batteries are working every day turning out men for overseas service and each day more recruits appear. The work is decidedly interesting and the officers are proving themselves efficient and popular as well by the way that more recruits arrive. The men in writing to their homes say how they like their work and they certainly have a great effect on inducing more men to enlist. There seems to be no let-up in the number of men who are volunteering for overseas service with the batteries.

The many friends of O.R.S. Wood of the 32nd Battery will be pleased to learn that he has been granted a commission and will qualify at the next Royal School of Artillery course.

Capt. Stothers, recruiting officer of Ottawa, is continuing his splendid work of bringing in the highest type of men for Major McKenzie's 32nd Battery. On Saturday he brought down twenty-two men and every one of them holds a Dominion Land Surveyor's certificate. These men volunteered as a body having just finished up their season's work with the Government on surveys throughout the uninhabited parts of the Dominion.

CLAIM OF POOR WOMAN

TO BE CONSIDERED, EVEN THOUGH OUTLAWED.

Ald. Richardson's Appeal To the City Council To Consider Its Moral Obligation Meets With Favor.

The City Council did something out of the ordinary on Monday evening. There was a clause in the Board of Works report recommending, on the advice of the City Solicitor, that no action be taken on the claim of Mrs. F. Roper for damages suffered on October 10th through a fall on Raglan Road. It appears that the law requires notice to be served on a municipal council seven days after such an accident. This notice was not served until seventeen days afterwards, and therefore the claim was outlawed.

Ald. A. W. Richardson drew the matter to the attention of Council. Technically the city was not liable, but he did not believe the Council should take advantage of a legal technicality if it was morally responsible. The average citizen, he said, knew nothing about law, and the working woman making the claim probably did not know she could even collect from the city until she had been told so by some friends. She had to go to hospital for treatment as the result of her fall upon what was alleged to be a defective walk, and she had been unable to earn her living for twelve days. If the city was morally liable, Ald. Richardson declared it should pay the damages asked. Other aldermen agreed with Ald. Richardson, and on motion of Ald. Hughes, the matter was referred back to the Board of Works for further consideration.
