CREDITS FOR BRITAIN

FURTHER VOTE WILL BE PROVIDED FOR WHEN NEEDED.

Time Has Arrived When Canada Can Extend a Measure of Credit to Imperial Government.

Ottawa, Dec. 21.—A further credit of fifty or one-hundred millions for the British Government in addition to the fifty millions already established by the Canadian Government will be provided when required and without any great difficulty. The present fifty million dollar credit will meet, in substantial measure, the financial requirements of the shell committee for some months to come.

With the lessening in the demands of the crop movement upon the Canadian financial system, a fresh large credit can be established, through the subscription of those engaged in the manufacture of munitions for British exchequer bonds and by the system of dollar acceptances or the purchase of the banks of short-date imperial treasury bills.

As the Finance Act of 1914 will remain in force, facilities will be available in case of need for the redoubling by the banks of any such securities or acceptances.

THE CHATEAU DESTROYED.

And Lieut. McKinnon Was Left Without Belongings.

Renfrew, Dec. 21.—Lieut. Kenneth McKinnon, M.D., has been in France since Sept. 7th. Since then he has been frequently close to the firing line, and has had some narrow escapes. He had been quartered in a beautiful home of a wealthy manufacturer; but a letter a week ago bore the news that the place had been hit by a shell and blown to pieces; Kenneth having no belongings now but the clothes on his back. This catastrophe occurred during four hours' shelling by the Germans. A later letter says there had been another bombardment for an hour, but less damage done.

Lighthouse Closed.

Brookville, Dec. 20.—Robert Boyd, the trustworthy keeper of the Five Mile Lighthouse on Thursday turned out the light for the last time this winter. Mr. Boyd thus completes twenty-nine years' continuous service in charge of the light and during all those years, in every condition of weather, he has been faithful to the discharge of his duties. The American lighthouses on the St. Lawrence were turned out Wednesday morning.

Catholic Parish Changes.

Peterboro, Dec. 20.—Changes are announced in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Peterboro, by which Rev. Father Fitzpatrick, Ennismore, who goes to Calgary, will be succeeded by Rev. Father McGuire, Downsville parish, and Rev. Father Casey, Bracebridge, comes to Norwood. Rev. Father McGinty, of the cathedral staff, becomes assistant to Rev. Father Kelly at Parry Sound, and the vacancy here will be filled by Rev. Father McHugh, Kingston.

KING ALBERT AND HIS QUEEN IN GREAT PERIL.

Coming From Mass, Huns Tried to Drop Bombs on the Congregation.

Paris, Dec. 21.—Details of the narrow escape from death recently of the king of queen of Belgium when German aviators threw bombs on the fishing village where the royal couple now reside, are printed today by the Petit Journal.

The king and queen were coming out of church from mass with the rest of the congregation, says the paper's correspondent, when six German aeroplanes appeared, flying low. Apparently they were coming from Ostend. The king at once told the people to scatter and take shelter but the aeroplanes approached so rapidly that few had time to comply with his instructions before the machines were over the village. Two bombs fell a few yards from the king and queen but they were not hit by the flying fragments.

Probable Acclamation in Township.

Gananoque, Dec. 20.—Practically the entire Council of the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne will seek reelection, and there is a probability that acclamation will be in order throughout the township to save election expenses. Badly Hurt.

Napanee, Dec. 18.—Fireman William Twigg, on the C. N. R. train running from Tweed to Kingston, met with a bad accident at Marlbank station. Twigg was in the act of getting off the engine, and in swinging out he struck the end of the station, and was dragged some distance. He was knocked unconscious, but revived later and was placed in the doctor's care at Marlbank. Mr. Twigg lives in Tweed.

Cannery At Law.

Toronto, Dec. 20.—Two writs have been issued by Canadian Canneries, Limited, of Hamilton, one against the Frankford Cannery and Preserving Co., Limited, and the other against Trent Valley Cannery, Limited, for \$30,000 and \$50,000, respectively. The plaintiffs allege breach of contract, and ask for an accounting. The defendants are of Trenton.

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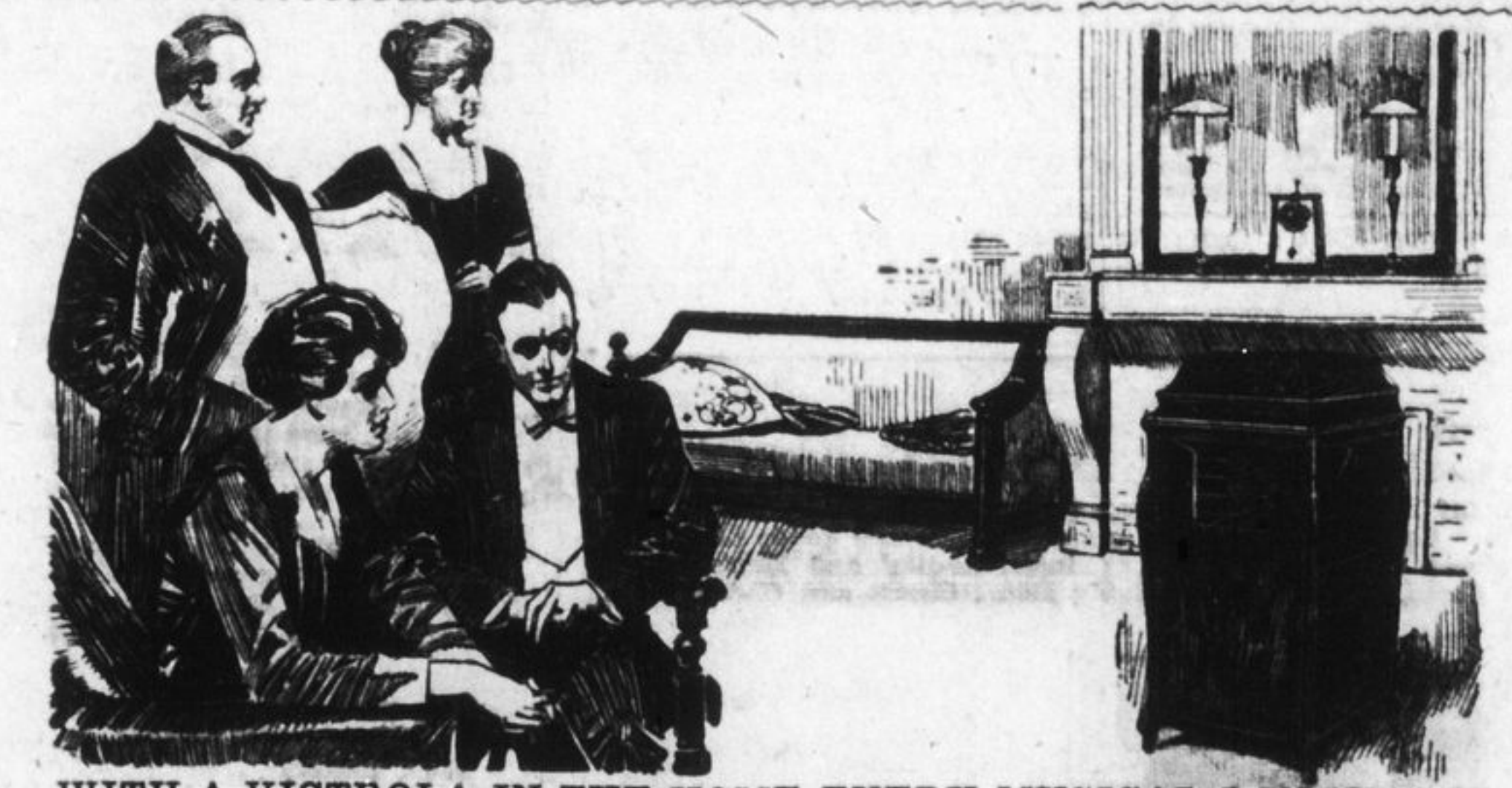
