**BROUGHT TO THE PEN**

ON DAY WHICH HAD BEEN SET FOR HIS EXECUTION

Herbert T. King, Owen Sound, Spent Tuesday Night in the Police Cells—Murderer Was Given a Reprieve.

On the very day which had been set for his execution for murder, Herbert T. King, arrived in Kingston and was taken to the penitentiary, where he will remain for the rest of his life.

King was found guilty of the murder of "Eddie" Nicholson, a twelve-year-old boy, near Owen Sound, last spring. His counsel worked hard to have him sent to prison for life, instead of paying the death penalty, and on Friday last notification was received from the Department of Justice, at Ottawa, relieving the murderer.

A constable came down to Kingston with King on Tuesday, and the accused spent the night in the cells at the police station.

He is an Englishman, about thirty-five years of age. It is claimed that he is insane, and that later he will be removed to an asylum.

King showed no great emotion when he received word that his life was to be saved, and that he would go to prison. He has claimed ever since his arrest that he was not of sound mind, and while in the police cells here he made the statement that the Justice Department "would not hang a crazy man."

The murder was a brutal one. King attacked the little boy after he had set fire to the barn of a relative and stabbed him to death, his plot being to put the boy out of the way as he knew of his movements.

**THE 8TH C. M. R. HAVE A FINE CAMP.**

Major W. A. Blue Writes From Bramshott, England, About Conditions There.

Major W. A. Blue, Ottawa, of the 8th C. M. R., which trained at Barrieheld, writes from Bramshott Camp, England:

"We are very comfortably situated here and are quartered in huts. They hold about forty men and have besides two doors and twenty large windows so there is plenty of ventilation. They are heated with stoves. Hot and cold shower baths are in separate huts so that the bugs have very little chance to multiply. All the refuse is burned in the camp incinerator. There is a large hospital here with 500 beds and they only take accidents and other ailments. Any of the usual diseases of soldiers are sent up to Aldershot.

"Our O. C. here is Lord Brooke, who is known to us Ottawa officers. Col. J. T. Shillington is the A. D. M. S. and Col. Poussette, a son of Dr. Poussette, of Windsor, is the A. D. C. officer. We have about 18,000 troops here now and they are coming in every day. The place is about forty miles from London and twenty from Portsmouth, and is on the old main road used in coaching days by Nelson and others on their way to the fleet."

**MUCH SHOP-LIFTING IN KINGSTON STORES.**

Dry Goods Stores Suffer Most—The Merchants To Show No Mercy.

Shop-lifting is being carried on in the city to such an extent as to become a serious problem for the business men. In one store only on Saturday last there were six cases of shop-lifting detected, while four more occurred in the same store on Monday. Other merchants tell a similar tale. Up to the present, the people who have been caught in this act have been allowed to go with a warning. Apparently, however, this warning has had no effect, and the merchants have now determined to prosecute with the full vigor of the law the next person caught. In some cases considerable property has been carried away; in others a close watch has resulted in the culprit being caught in time. The merchants have shown great leniency in dealing with this class of offenders. They have probably taken a wise step in determining that they will show no mercy in the future. It is understood that the drygoods stores are the chief stamping ground for those who covet their neighbor's goods.

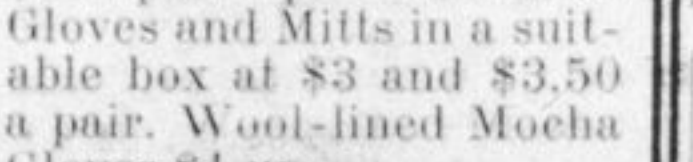
