CHRISTMAS SERVICES WERE HELD IN THE CHURCHES ON SUNDAY.

Midnight Mass in St. Mary's Cathedral—Special Music Was Rendered By the Various Choirs.

The midnight mass in St. Mary's Cathedral was celebrated with much pomp and magnificence. His Grace, the Archbishop, officiated, being assisted by deacon and sub-deacon. The altar was resplendent with lights and flowers and presented a delightful appearance. The musical part of the service was of a high order of excellence and was much enjoyed by the large congregation present. Glegand's latest mass for three male voices was brilliantly rendered by the joint choirs of boys and men under the baton of N. E. O'Connor. Prof. Paul Denyes presided at the organ. The usual Christmas hymns and canticles, familiar to the ear, but beautiful in their simplicity, occupied their wonted place and were much appreciated. Customary collection was taken at the door and proved once more the generosity of the faithful. In the course of the ceremony His Grace extended hearty greetings and exhorted all to shun the works of darkness and walk in the light. At the close Pontifical benediction was imparted.

At Queen Street Church.

The Christmas service in Queen street Methodist Church was very fine with a large audience present. The music was exceptionally strong. The anthems were presented with splendid swing while the solo work was of a high order taken by Mrs. Evans, Mr. Pound, H. Angrove and Mrs. F. J. H. Coleman. A quartette, composed of Messrs Pound, Pottigrew, Angrove and Lyons gave a fine selection. Mr. Campbell spoke well on Christmas themes. The Sunday school had a special programme in the afternoon with a group of Christmas pictures of a high character.

St. Luke's Church.

In St. Luke's Church on Christmas Day and on Sunday, the services were accompanied by beautiful musical selections. At the morning prayer and communion service on Christmas morning and also at the Sunday morning's service the following programme was carried out: "Hark the Herald Angels Sing"; Te Deum; quartette, Mrs. Bates, Miss Condon; and Messrs Jennings and Pardee; anthem, "The First Christmas Morn"; "Nazareth"; G. St. George's Cathedral.

Christmas was the usual busy time about St. George's Cathedral. The decorations were very beautiful, the evergreens festooned about the interior and around the choir appropriate to the season were in red and gold. The effect against the white walls was striking. Holy Communion was celebrated at 6.30, 8 and 11 a.m. with large attendance at each service.
