was the Seymour Company, which should be given a chance. Dr. Richardson said that if the best men were secured, it would not matter what system of government the city adopted. Good government depended upon the honesty, the integrity, the moral and the mental fibre of the rulers rather than upon the number, whether large or small. The people had elected a commission to govern the utilities, and yet it was a committee of the City Council that gave the people "dollar gas." The speaker was opposed to reducing the number of aldermen, because he was convinced that no good would result. Better to have twenty-one aldermen than fourteen. "If you want the Council to conserve your interests, keep it at its present numbers," said Dr. Richardson.

"I am willing to go before the people every day and give an account of my public actions, and other representatives should be the same," said Dr. Richardson. Hence the one-year aldermanic term appealed to him. In conclusion, Dr. Richardson spoke about standing as the labor candidate several years ago. "I have never regretted taking the hand of the workmen and standing for their interests," declared the speaker, who added that if he was elected he would stand for equal rights for every class and creed in the city.

G. Y. Chown Speaks. George Y. Chown, one of the Utilities Commissioners, and nominated for another term, spoke briefly. He hoped the Commission would be retained. It was strongly supported by Dr. A. E. Ross, now at the front, and who was largely responsible for inaugurating it. Regarding power rates, Mr. Chown said that the basis laid down by the Commission was that all consumers should pay their fair share.

Ald. McCann's Address. In addressing the electors, Ald. McCann referred to his nine years of service in the City Council. He congratulated Mayor Sutherland on the splendid record he has made during the past year. He has shown a fervency and zeal in the discharge of his duties which is to be admired and worthy of emulation. There has been much accomplished during his term and many schemes proposed by him with which the speaker was familiar and should the people see fit to elect him for next year he hoped to carry to completion.

Amongst the unfinished schemes he mentioned the renumbering of the streets. This is a shocking condition and should have the earliest attention of next year's Council. A most important undertaking is the carrying to completion of the re-adjustment of "The Lands of Occupation." When this is carried to a successful issue it will mean a civic factory worth many thousands of dollars to the city.

The several questions submitted for the ratepayers consideration at the approaching election will, he hoped, have full attention. There is unfortunately too much apathy by the electors on such occasions, the speaker said. The monthly collections of electricity and gas is a great inconvenience as well as expensive and should be discontinued, he said. The old system, in this regard, is preferable and he thought would be found less expensive.

Ald. McCann advocated a change in the mode of assessment. Vacant land should be assessed to its full market and not allowed to absorb at the city's expense all the unearned increment. This would have a tendency to bring vacant land into use not only more work but lower rents. An effort should also be made to induce land owners to lend their vacant lots to citizens who are willing to cultivate them, and who by circumstances or ill-health are not able to engage in regular occupations but are able to do light work of this nature. This has been tried in several other places with great success.

Whether the Utilities continue under the Commission or under a committee of Council a re-adjustment should be made with regard to power and lighting rates, giving relief to the consumer. It is most important that we obtain cheap power without delay. Cheap power is the very life blood of industrialism and the city must get relief.
