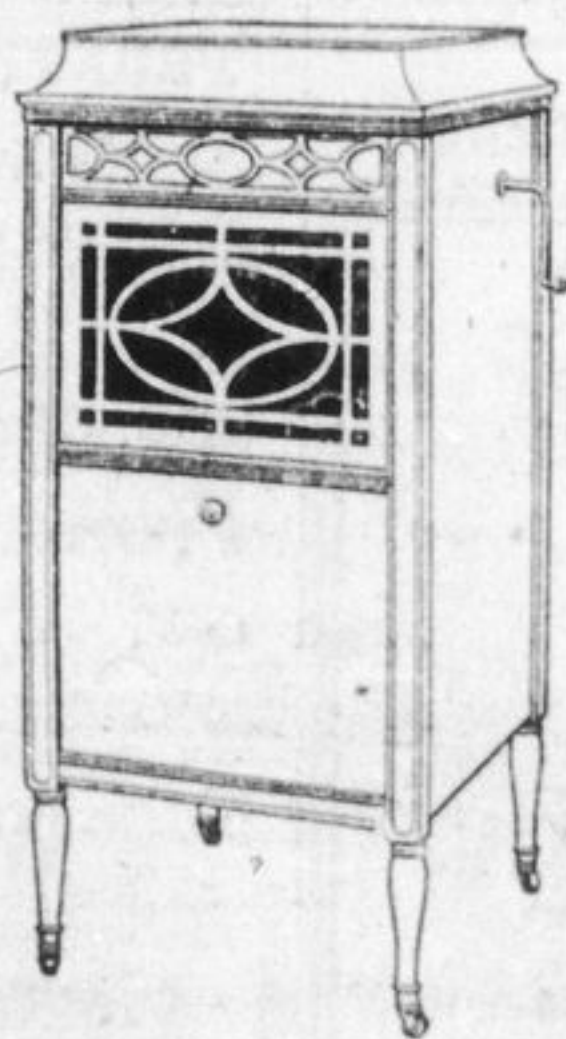

**NEWS ABOUT TROOPS**  
**QUARTERED IN CITY**

"Don't talk; the enemy may hear," is the slogan that is being carried out by Government request throughout France, and a word might also be given to Kingstonians. Ever since the war broke out the Kingston garrison has been the training place for a great many soldiers and for this reason every person has taken an interest in the soldiers' welfare. Every few weeks troops leave the district for the front. In every case some of these men have Kingston friends and the men naturally tell their friends when they are leaving. The information almost always seems to leak out despite close censorship by the authorities and the care taken by the newspapers. The authorities have found it wise to keep the transportation of troops a secret as much as possible but the public do not seem to realize the necessity of helping them.

There is no reason why people should become frightened over a spy scare but it is very wise that the time of departure of troop-trains be kept secret, and for this reason if citizens happen to hear when troops trains are leaving they should not spread the news but keep it quiet so that it would not reach the ears of the Germans.

Lieut. Ross Livingston, 5th Field Battery, and Lieut. L. Macgillivray, 6th London Battery, have reported for duty with the 53rd Battery.

E. Bacon is sergeant cook in the 34th Battery, and he and his family have a military record. Sergt. Bacon has been in the Canadian militia since 1884, and for twenty years was Squadron sergeant-major in the C.G. B.G. Toronto. When the war broke out he with his two sons Russel Calvin and James Cussons enlisted for overseas service, in the 3rd B. Battalion. When the battalion reached England, much to the disappointment of Sergt. Bacon he was informed that under the regulations he could not be allowed to go to the front owing to his age. His two sons, however, were able to go over, and Sergt. Bacon came back and re-enlisted in another attempt. A short while ago Russel arrived back in Toronto with a fractured skull and is now in a convalescent home. The other son is still at the front.

An epidemic of slight colds seems to have broken out in the garrison and a large percentage of the soldiers are asking their doctors for cough cures.

Lieut. McA'Nulty, 33rd Battery, is in the Hotel Dieu with a severe cold.

Lieut. Stevenson is also on the sick-list.

Lieut. King, 32nd Battery, is in the General Hospital with a severe cold and Lieut. Beck is also ill.

Caps with "side-curtains" and overshoes are coming to the soldiers of the garrison. The exact meaning of the side curtains cannot yet be explained as they have not arrived, but it is expected that they will be of the new trench type and made for winter use.

Through the efforts of Lieut. Boyd two recruits from Bobcaygean arrived for the 33rd Battery on Tuesday. Two Brockville men, secured through the major's efforts, will attend the next Royal School of Artillery.

Lieuts. Macgillivray and Shortt had the men of the 33rd Battery on route-marches on Tuesday afternoon.

Lieut. A. A. McQueen who passed fifth in the fourth Royal School of Artillery course is now left second commander in the 29th Guelph Battery and doing good work.

Special attention must be paid to saluting according to a recent order.

Lieut. Waters gave a lecture to the men of the 32nd Battery on saluting on Tuesday.

Capt. Gill had the men of the 32nd Battery on a ride on Tuesday. The battymen are becoming good horsemen.

A number of officers of the garrison are attending a dance in Nanawane which is being given by the 80th Battalion officers there.

The 59th Battalion is taking on recruits every day.

Major Williams, Lieut. A. P. Christmas and Lieut. B. C. Pierce are on a board of enquiry to determine the loss by fire of certain articles of kit and clothing of a member of the 59th Battalion.

Lieut. R. H. L. Uglow, 80th Battalion, has been transferred to Divisional Signallers at Ottawa.

**JOHN GRAY, CLAYTON, DEAD.**

Prominent Resident Passes Away At Advanced Age.

Clayton, N. Y., Dec. 29.—John Gray, aged over eighty years, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Edith Halliday, in this village, on Friday night from disease of the heart. During the past year or two Mr. Gray had been in rather feeble health. Mr. Gray was born in Clyde, Wayne County, N. Y., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Gray, who a few years previously had come to the United States from Edinburgh, Scotland. Soon after his birth his parents moved to near Redwood, N. Y., and he has since been a resident of Jefferson County. He was married to Nancy, daughter of Lodowick and Julia Dillon, of Alexandria, and to them were born Frederick, Nettie, George, Richard, Edith and Burton Gray.

After spending his early life near Redwood, Mr. Gray removed to the town of Clayton, where for years he was a prosperous farmer, retiring from active life a few years ago.

During the Civil War he enlisted in Company K, Tenth Heavy Artillery, serving three years, and was honorably discharged. He was always an active member of Albert Denis Post, G. A. R., having served a number of years as commander and held an office at the time of his death. The members of the post will attend the funeral in a body.

Besides his daughter, Mrs. Halliday, he is survived by four sons, Frederick D., George E., Burton F., and Dr. Richard L. Gray, all of Clay-

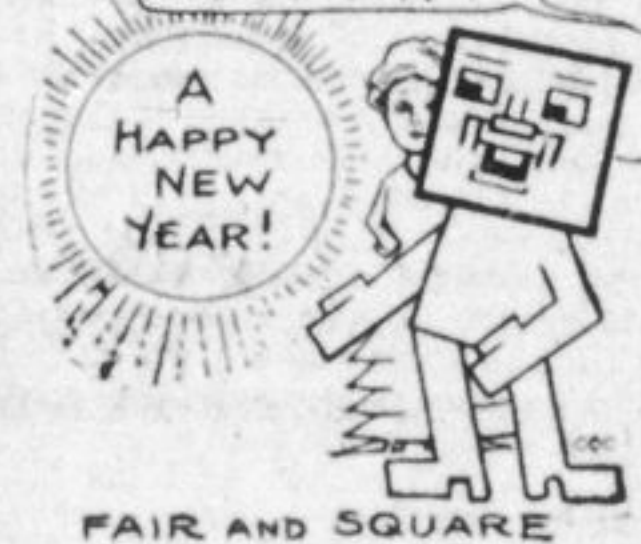
