MORE CONTRIBUTIONS

WERE EXPECTED BY THE GENERAL HOSPITAL.

But Hope is Expressed That Some People Have Been Tardy. Signal Light System Criticized.

The Board of Governors of Kingston General Hospital met on Monday afternoon.

The report of the Committee of Management mentioned an improvement in the ventilation of the public wards. This was very much needed and it is now possible to have a complete circulation of fresh air without draught.

The hospital is receiving renovation in the way of painting, kitchening etc., and the lighting in many parts of the building improved. New furniture in the way of beds, cots and mattresses has been added to the Doran building, and the wards in this part are now considered in excellent condition.

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Activities during December continued in every department, the number of patients received and discharged being about the same as the month previous. The death rate for the month was particularly small.

T. F. Harrison and J. Crawford, visiting governors for last month, reported having gone over the building in company with the Superintendent of Nurses and found the general conditions very satisfactory. They made some suggestions in regard to improvements in speed and efficiency of the elevator in the main building.

The signal light system in the Emery wing was severely criticised by the visiting governors, and the Committee of Management was instructed that the contractor put it in satisfactory condition at once.

F. G. Lockett was appointed visiting governor for next month and asked to select an associate.

The members present were C. F. Chown (chairman), R. E. Kent, William Anderson, J. Crawford, F. F. Harrison, G. Y. Chown and F. G. Lockett.

HAD EXCITING TIME

KINGSTONIAN WRITES ABOUT GAS AND ARTILLERY ATTACKS.

Walter Noyes, of Signalling Corps, Tells About Some of the Experiences at the Front—Men Are Now Well Prepared For Gas Attacks.

Walter Noyes, with the Signalling Corps at the front, has written an interesting letter under date of Dec. 15th to "Jack" North, of 249 Wellington street, in which he says: "It is a beautiful day. The sun is shining, and it is not cold. The worst part of it is the mud. There is mud-up to our knees where we are now, and it is a case of getting our feet wet every day, but it will have to dry up some day. Last night we had a gas and artillery attack. The bombing was about the heaviest yet. It went on all through the night, and there was a continual rattle and crash, shaking everything. Once or twice it disturbed my sleep, but not for long, as you soon get used to it. The gas was pretty heavy, but the wind changed early in the morning and took it off quickly. It is doubtful if the Germans gained anything by it, because every one is pretty well prepared for gas or anything. There were a couple of good aerial flares this morning. One took place directly above us, and we all had quite an exciting time of it."

The writer states that he met Frank Sherring, an old Kingston boy. He is with one of the western battalions. He says every mail brings boxes to the men, and that it is like an old-time Christmas, to see the boys gathered together when the parcels are opened. Each man shares the good things, and they are like "kids" once more.
