

AN EMBARGO PLACED

Ottawa, Jan. 4.-An order-in-Council prohibiting the export of scrap steel and scrap wrought iron and of oatmeal, rolled oats and hay has been passed by the Government. The prohibition of hay export merely carries into effect the embargo which as recently announced was placed on hay from Canada except for the United Kingdom, British possesisons and protectorate. France, Italy, Japan and Russia (except Baltic ports). The prohibition of the export of scrap steel applies to all destinations abroad other than the United Kingdom, British possessions and protectorates. The prohibition of rolled oats and oatmeal export is to all foreign ports in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than those of France, Russia (except Baltic ports), Italy Belgium, Spain and Portugal.
